# Cardinals Win First Clash With New York Giants 3-2; Cubs Halt Dodgers

## Canada All Set For Stiff Play Against Scotch

(By The Canadian Press) JLAGGOW, May 13—Seventeen footballers, heroes all in the eyes of Scottish fans—and they are rare judges of soccer players in the Land of the Heather—are on the Atlantic Ocean bound for a tour which will take in many of the principal cities in Canada and the United States.

The team is scheduled to arrive in New York Tuesday and the first match will be played in Philadelphia four days later. The Scots will make their first appearance in Canada May 22 when they play in Toronto.

How Canadians team will measure up against this prize shipment which includes eight internationalists, five of whom were members of the side that defeated England at Hampden Park early in April, will be a matter of intense interest for followers of the dribbling code in this country.

The Scottish selectors in picking such a strong side evidently had in mind the memorable, if somewhat fluky 3-2 defeat handed to the touring team in the third game of that tour. The wearers of the thistle on that occasion apparently had not got their land-legs as they came right back a few weeks later and gave the same team a 10-0 drubbing. The Scottish scout-chief will be unarmished at the end of the forthcoming tour if the selectors know anything.

Undoubtedly chief individual interest will lie in the play of Tommy Walker, heart of Midlothian's sensational 19 year old inside right. Rated the biggest discovery in two decades clubs up and down the United Kingdom have cast envious eyes on him. But money talks and it looks as though the wealthy Arsenal will trot him out for the benefit of their supporters at Highbury next season. At all events it is said in London, Gunn's officials have offered a record sum of \$60,000 for his services. Early in the year the Edinburgh club turned down a \$50,000 offer. The highest transfer fee on record is \$83,000 paid by Aston Villa to Portsmouth last year for J. Allen.

Canadian fans, particularly in Ontario, will renew acquaintances with Robert Whitley, McDonald, rugged Irish international fullback who has played with Glasgow since he was lured from his Hamilton, Ont., home by the great Scottish club. "Whitley" is one of the best contributions Canada has made to old country football.

Although born in Inland McDonald was brought to Canada at an early age and learned the game in Ontario schools. Later he played right-half for Hamilton Thistles and was playing for Ulster United, a Toronto club, when Rangers were attracted by his sterling play. Going to Glasgow, "Whitley" was quickly converted into a fullback and his finest play for the Scottish team has been in that position.

Some Sterling Players "Davy" Melkielejohn is the old man of the team and is making his second visit to Canada. Cool as the proverbial cucumber the play of this steady Scot is a delight to watch. He is regarded as the best halfback Scotland has produced since the war. It might safely be said that he is the pivot about which the formidable Rangers attack revolves. "Davy" is the proud possessor of 20 cups.

Sharing the spotlight with Melkielejohn is that centre-forward and high-sprinter, who now plays for Derby County in English football. Since he crashed into first-class soccer he has played for Queen of the South, Alderstonians, Newcastle United, Chelsea and his present club. He has bagged 20 goals for Scotland in international matches.

The Scots are bringing another centre-forward and curiously enough he is an Englishman, David Wilson of Hamilton Academicals. A native of Hebburn, near Newcastle, the Academicals discovered him and have never regretted transferring him to Lanarkshire. Soccer of the two goals by which Scotland defeated England in the last international. Douglas "Dally" Duncan is another Derby County player included in the Scottish team. He is a wizard on the wing and those who have seen him play are at a loss to understand how he came by his nickname.

One of the most consistent goalkeepers in Scotland, William Stevenson of Clyde, will guard the nets on the North American tour. Andrew Anderson, Hearts, and George Cummings, Patrick Thistle, will share with McDonald the work of the last line of defence.

With Melkielejohn the half-backs are Robert Fraser, Aberdeen, Peter Wilson, Hibernians, Robert Donnelly, Patrick Thistle, and Thomas Smith, Kilmarnock.

In addition to Walker, Gallacher, David Wilson and Duncan the forwards include William Miller, Patrick Thistle, William Mills, Aberdeen, Robert Main, Rangers and Alex Ferguson, St. Johnstone.

# Rowe In Top Form Blanks New York Yankees 3-0; Sox Defeat Lowly Browns

By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, May 13—Lynwood (Schoolboy) Rowe, five-times conqueror of New York Yankees last year, resumed his mastery over the New Yorkers today as he shut them out with four singles to give Detroit Tigers a 3-0 victory at Detroit in the teams' first clash of the season.

At the same time, Rowe emerged victorious in his first mound duel with Vernon (Lefty) Gomez, southpaw ace of the Yankees. Gomez was touched for three hits and six of the Tigers' hits before he was lifted for a pinch hitter in the seventh. Pat Malone finished the game.

Rowe, who has had a difficult time getting started this spring after winning 24 games for the American League champions last year, was in fine form. He gave only one base on balls and did not allow a hit until one man was out in the fourth.

St. Louis Browns slipped into a tie with Philadelphia for cellar place honors in the American League by dropping a tight 2-1 decision to Boston Red Sox at St. Louis.

The Red Sox evened the series behind the five-hit hurling of Wesley Ferrell, who held a clear edge in a pitching duel with Fay Thomas and won his own game with a long home run in the seventh inning.

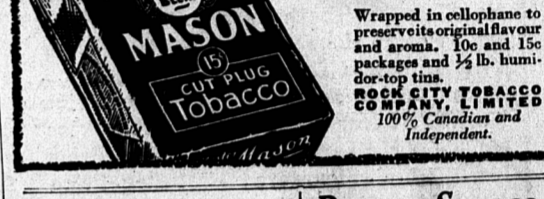
