The farewell reception tendered Dr. and Mrs. Smith in the Presbyterian Church, Summerside Monday evening was the grandest affair of the kind ever given any person or persons leaving this town. The church was packed, every seat being filled while many persons were obliged to stand. No stronger feeling of general regret could have been shown than that which was expressed in the words of farewell or evident in every countenance in the church last evening. Dr. K. Carle was chairman. The following program was carried out:

Anthem, "Praise ye the Father," Prayer by Rev. Mr. McCully; Male Quartette, "The Golden Tomorrow" by Messrs. Leard, Morrison, Whitey and Bealston. Then came an address of farewell to Dr. Smith from the young men which was read by A. S. McKay and was accompanied by a suit case specially made. The following address from the congregation was then read by J. H. Bell and accompanied by \$100 in gold.

DEAR PASTOR—In the providence of God you and we, as pastor and people, have come to the dividing of the way and it remains for us to say farewell. Before doing so, we deem it our duty and privilege to bear testimony to the ability, wholehearted devotion and sympathy with which you entered into the many and onerous duties of your pastorate.

Your scholarly and earnest exposition of sacred truth, your unvarying kindness and attention, your readiness to help in every good work, and above all the ennobling example of nearly Christian character which you have constantly set before us, have been a blessing and an inspiration, the influence of which will remain with us through life. For over five years you have gone in an out among us, bringing to us the bread of life; you have rejoiced with us in our times of rejoicing and ministered to us in our sorrows; you have comforted our dying and stood with us by the graves of our beloved dead, and in all your ministrations we have found you a friend and a brother.

Then came an address to Mrs. Smith from the ladies read by Mrs. Steeves and accompanied by the presentation of a silver pudding dish and a silver fern dish. This was followed by an address to Mrs. Smith from the Women's Foreign Missionary Society read by Mrs. N. McLeod. Short addresses were made by G. M. Reid, Rev. A. D. McCully and Rev. A. N. Simpson.

Following this came a solo "Thy will be done" pathetically sung by Miss Sinclair accompanied in the chorus by the choir.

Dr. Smith in an address of about fifteen minutes replied feelingly, thanking the congregation and the young men for the kind addresses and valuable gifts, and also thanking the ladies on behalf of Mrs. Smith. He attributed the measure of success that had attended his five years' pastorate in Summerside to the cordial co-operation of the congregation. He paid a high tribute to the efficiency and executive ability of the Board of Managers to whose efforts the splendid financial condition of the congregation is largely due. He also specially addressed the young men exhorting them to stand by the principles of manliness and uprightness. He had been much helped in his work and ministry by these rows of young manly faces which confronted him in this church every Sunday, and he felt that with such manliness ready to take up the burden of life that influence for good is being developed in Summerside.

The choir and congregation joined in singing very feelingly "God be with you till we meet again."

After closing prayer and benediction by Rev. Mr. Simpson the congregation filed out through the church parlor where they shook hands in farewell with Dr. and Mrs. Smith who left yesterday for Sydney.

Capt. Read seconded the amendment. The Opposition resolution would tend to defeat the objects of the mover. The Opposition resolution was only for political capital. He pictured Canada as a coy maiden sought by different wooers—Britain and the United States and both would be driven away should Canada make too great advances to her lovers. He claimed that it was Free Trade that made Great Britain great. The United States will need a soft free trade to live. The people are leaving the United States because of protection and Canada too would have been driven to desperation had she continued the Conservatives in power. When Sir Wilfrid came to power he was nearly as possible a toped free trade with injuring the vested interests of the Dominion. Canada has held out the olive branch of preferential trade to Great Britain and led Mr. Chamberlain to give forth his propaganda. Preferential trade was to some extent a passing fad and he doubted even then if the United States held out a policy of reciprocity but that Canada would accept it. Now we had the United States as well as Britain holding for our trade, we now have two strings to our bow. He did not although approve of the amendment but of the three evils he would take the least and support the amendment. To be continued.
