The C. P. R. in Nova Scotia

The Amherst Daily News says editorially:

What the Canadian Pacific Railway has actually accomplished for Canada, since its construction some forty years ago, is the reason why so many Nova Scotians are anxious it should extend the area of its operations in this province. The name of the road is synonymous with progressiveness and success. Its activity in the Western part of Canada in the way of colonization opened up that country to the attention of the world long before any other line of railway was ever thought of. It risked practically everything, in the days of its construction, to bridge the waste sections at the head of the Lakes and in penetrating the Rockies, and its success in this engineering undertaking gave inspiration to its directors to push forward on other lines.

The government owned railway, the Canadian National, now has a greater number of miles, and is proving a powerful competitor, but this does not alter the fact that many sections of this Province are not yet well served with railway transportation facilities, and that a greater development would be possible if the Canadian Pacific decided to set its forces in motion. The Company has its own railway line from Yarmouth to Halifax and Truro, and it has a steamboat service on the Atlantic and between several shipping ports on the Bay of Fundy. If there is any basis for the latest report that it intends improving its railway service from Montreal to Halifax, by way of Saint John and Digby, so as to make it several hours quicker than the present service, there will be many to rejoice. This will be a rivalry in service with the Canadian National, and is preferable to a ruinous competition through costly running rights over the same road. One can wish the Canadian National well and still hope that the directors of the C. P. R. will see their way clear to the putting of more intensive effort into the work of developing their business and territory in Nova Scotia.
