He explained that the Federal Department at Ottawa has what is known as a "bull loaning policy" which consists of three units governed by a central committee.

With reference to our population Mr. Myers said he was sorry that his good friend Dr. Gauthier seemed to strike a pessimistic note when he told Mr. Phillips that our population was expected to exceed 75,000.

Before resuming my seat, the speaker said there is one other matter that I would like to mention, that is the question of immigration. 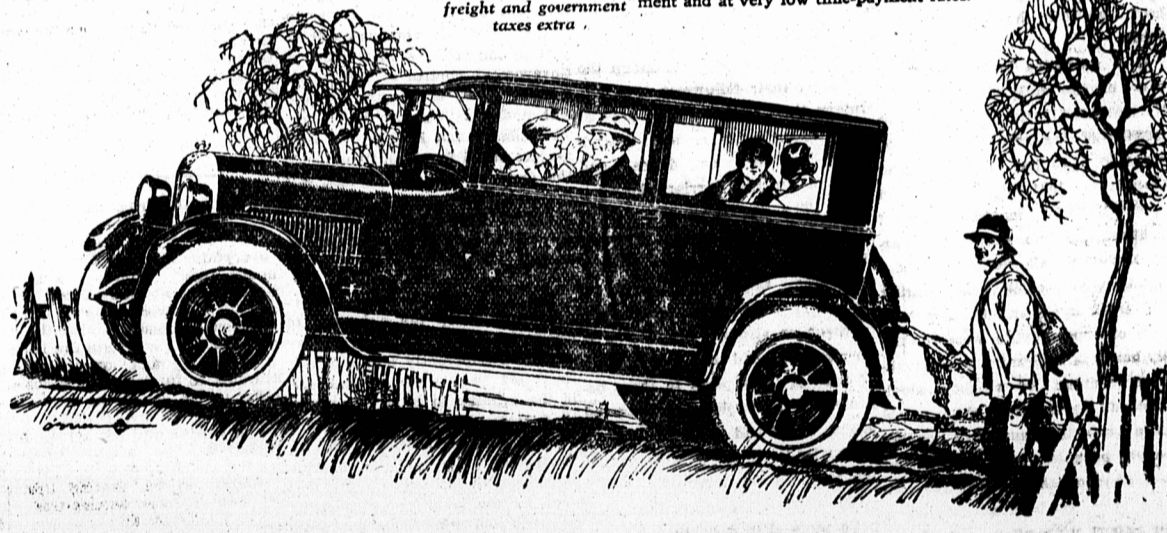
