## LAST WEEK'S SUBMARINE RECORD

LONDON, Nov. 1.—Fourteen British merchantmen over 1600 tons, were sunk by mine or submarine in the past week, according to the Admiralty report last night. Four vessels under 1600 tons were sunk, but no fish craft were sunk.

## ALL BRITISH GUNS ON ITALIAN FRONT WERE SAVED

LONDON, Nov. 1.—All the British guns with the Italian army were saved, according to a British correspondent at Italian Headquarters who says that the "spirits" of the British gunners are good. Lack of transport which could not be allotted to them, was their whole trouble. One gun was so near to having to be abandoned that the breech mechanism was destroyed. However, the gun was saved eventually.

## ELECTIONS ON DECEMBER 17 NOMINATION NOVEMBER 19

**Writs Issued for General Election. Nomination November 19th, Polling December 17 in all Districts Except Yukon. All Writs Returnable February 27th.**

OTTAWA, November 1.—Writs were issued last night calling for a general election on Monday, December 17th. Nomination Day is fixed for Monday, November 19th. This applies to all constituencies except the Yukon territory. Where nomination day will be December 31st, and polling day four weeks later, Monday, January 28th. All writs are returnable on February 27th, 1918. Parliament is summoned to meet on the following day.

## ANOTHER AIR RAID ON ENGLISH COAST

**Three Machines Penetrated to Heart of London While Other Groups Were Dispersed by Anti-Aircraft Guns. Eight Persons Killed, 21 Injured.**

LONDON, Nov. 1.—"Aircraft crossed the southwest coast in relays between 10.45 and 11.30 o'clock last night and proceeded towards London," says an official communication just issued. About 30 airplanes in seven groups, took part in the raid. Three of them penetrated to the heart of London. Eight persons were killed and twenty-one others wounded in the German first group of raiders dropped bombs air raid last night, according to an official statement issued today by the British War Department.

## SPLENDID MEETING HELD AT MORELL

**Premier Arsenault Effectually Exposes the Campaign Fallacies of Mr. Bell and Justly Scores Him for His Cowardly Attack on Mr. L. L. Jenkins.**

A joint meeting in connection with the forthcoming bye-election in St. Peter's Bay was held on Wednesday night at Morell. Mr. John McGregor was unanimously appointed chairman. There was a large and enthusiastic attendance, and the order throughout the meeting was exemplary. The speakers were all limited as to time and without exception received an attentive hearing. The Premier was present and made a splendid speech, which was obviously effective, dealing with some of the misrepresentations of the Opposition and putting clearly and convincingly before the meeting the true position of affairs. Others who addressed the meeting were: Dr. MacDonald and Mr. McIntyre, Conservative and Liberal Candidates, respectively; Mr. Jas. McIsaac, Hon. H. D. McEwen, Mr. J. H. Bell, Mr. J. J. Hughes and Mr. R. N. Cox. All the speakers made fitting reference to the death of Mr. McIntyre.

The first speaker was Dr. MacDonald. He said it afforded him great pleasure to address the large audience present. Such a splendid attendance, he said, demonstrated clearly one fact: that, irrespective of party, the people look a lively interest in the affairs of the province and were anxious to have matters discussed before them. He solicited their support, and promised, if elected, to co-operate with his colleagues. Mr. Ewen, in securing every possible advantage for the district, and he was sure much could be done by two members supporting the Government that had done so much for the province.

Mr. McIntyre followed. He gave as one reason why Dr. MacDonald should not be elected the fact that he was a physician with a large practice and would be unable to devote the same attention to the interests of the district as he (Mr. McIntyre) could. He criticized the policy of the Government in connection with the prosecution of the oyster fishing industry, and also complained of the roads.

## CITY OF BEERSCHIEBA TAKEN BY BRITISH

(Canadian Press Despatch)  
LONDON, Nov. 1.—The City of Beersheba, in Palestine has been captured by the British it is announced officially.

The statement says: "General Allenby, (of the British forces in Egypt) reports that after a night march our troops attacked Beersheba yesterday morning, while our infantry attacked the defences covering the town from the west and southwest. Mounted troops made a wide turning movement through the desert and approached it from the east. BEERSHEBA was occupied in the evening in spite of determined resistance by the enemy."

## ITALIANS UNITED BY RECENT DISASTER

(Canadian Press Despatch)  
LONDON, Nov. 1.—The disaster on the Isonzo has welded together all sections of Italy and has suppressed political antagonism, says the Milan correspondent of the Daily Telegraph, who adds that everything is being done to meet the invasion. Troops are being hurried from depots and all available sources are being drawn upon. All the great arteries of transport are being utilized for military purposes, hundreds of convalescent officers in all hospitals are demanding that they be sent to the front. Eight hundred such applications were made in Rome alone. The whole third army of the Carso, with its guns and material, got away safely, the correspondent adds, and will give battle when the time comes. The Austro-Germans are being held in check and the concentration of the Venetian plains is proceeding without hindrance.
