A party consisting of L. M. Manning, M. Farsett, J. Farsett and child, and M. Feehan, Boston, were among the arrivals at the Queen from the mail train last night.

S. S. "Harland" will leave for Cranford Thursday morning at 3 o'clock returning about 10 a. m., leaving here again at 3 p. m., and returning same night about 9.30. There will be no Wednesday afternoon sailing this week.

The mail train arrived in this city last evening at ten thirty, forty minutes late. All other trains to this city were on time yesterday with the exception of the Murray Harbor train due at nine thirty-five, which was fifteen minutes behind time.

Yesterday morning Captain Caspar Kohse, Captain of the Russian schooner "Presto" of Wladiv, Russia, now lying at Souris, came to this city in search of two sailors off the "Presto" who had deserted. Captain Kohse located his men all right and attempted to arrest them and take them back to their vessel, acting according to the marine law which provides for such a contingency arising in the case of a vessel in a foreign port. A crowd assembled around the captain and sided with the deserting members of the crew. The result was that the captain had to give up his attempts at getting his men back for the present. He called at the Police Station to obtain assistance and in the meantime the two sailors took passage on the Northumberland. Marshal Cameron acting on the request of Captain Kohse, wired the men's descriptions to the Police officials and on the arrival of the boat in that port they were apprehended and will be held until the morning when it is expected they will be sent for.

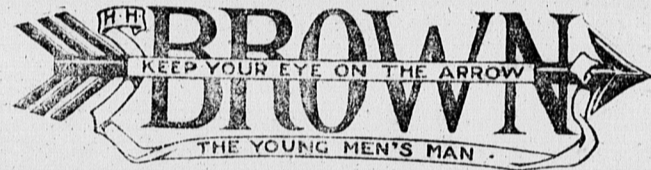

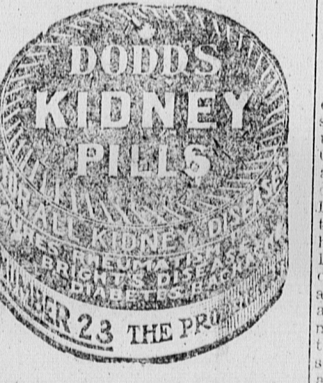

There is no higher ideal than that of the craftsman. It is the soul speaking; it is the spirit in the work. God, indeed, is the greatest Craftsman of all. In fact, so far as we may reason from what we see, craftsmanship is His chief attribute. Love, mercy, justice, wrath—these things we have guessed at. All we have evidence of is craftsmanship. Look about you—look at the curve of a mountain range, at white clouds and blue sky, at a clump of purple asters, and golden-rod, at a cispinnant's tail, at a pine tree against the winter sunset, at the flash of the sun on a mountain peak, "can't it be a bit presumptuous to suppose that these things were made for our pleasure alone?"

"And the earth brought forth grass, and the herb yielding seed after its kind, and the tree yielding fruit, whose seed was in itself, after his kind; and God saw that it was good."

I do not mean to be irreverent, writes Walter A. Dyer in the Craftsman. The noblest conception we have of God is as the Creator—which means Craftsman. Why does the spider weave that wonderful gossamer wheel of his so beautifully? An inclined to think he has a bit of divine soul in him—rather more, perhaps, than a miser or a seducer. It is craftsmanship, then, that our souls are blindly groping for, whether we be empire builders or dream-makers. To make something worth making, and to make it as nearly perfect as possible is craftsmanship. Thus a good cobbler is more godlike than a

poor preacher. I fancy that Jesus of Nazareth was a good carpenter, and that St. Francis was a good maker of tents. It is craftsmanship that constitutes the difference between a statesman and a politician. One builds; the other manipulates. It is the lack of craftsmanship in our modern financiers that make us distrust them, just as we distrust petty bankers for their profit, nothing for their accomplishment. It is the lack of craftsmanship that makes mere social prominence seem empty to thinking men and women.

WORLD'S GREAT UNIVERSITIES.

"When we think of Harvard or Yale, the former dating from 1633 and the latter from 1791, we think of them as 'old universities,'" says a writer in the American Educational Review. "But when we pass to the other side of the world we discover that even the oldest American universities are in reality very young institutions."

"The oldest educational institution in the world is the University of El Aghar, Cairo, founded in the year 988 by the great Selahib. It is the central seat of learning for the whole Mohammedan world as well as a fountain of spiritual life. It occupies an ancient mosque in the Arab quarter of Cairo, surrounded by a confusing maze of narrow streets where the population is made up of representatives of every race that follow the prophet."

"The old mosque covers several acres and consists of a series of courts surrounded by long cloisters with low

The floor of red tiles are covered daily by a multitude of men and boys, squatting in semi-circles around their teachers, who sit with their backs to the columns, lecturing in monotonous.

"The chancellor of the university is always a descendant of the prophet and is usually a man of ability and learning. He occupies apartments in El Aghar and is not only the supreme educational but the ecclesiastical head of the church in Egypt."

"There is no organization similar to that in modern universities. Any reputable man who desires to teach can obtain the privilege by application and is assigned a column where he may sit and impart the truth as he thinks proper. His fame or ability will attract more or less students and disciples, who pay him fees according to their means."

SALTING INFANTS.

Salting newly born infants is a practice, many centuries old, which

is still common in parts of Asia and eastern Europe. In some countries, as rural Germany and Greece, it is more a symbolic rite than anything else, but in certain tribes of Asia Minor the baby is literally covered in salt, except its face, until the skin is red and the irritation becomes a torture. This ancient custom arose from a belief that the preserving properties of salt would in some way strengthen and sustain the child, and incidentally ward off evil spirits. It is as old as Bible times. The prophet Ezekiel, referring to the degeneracy of Jerusalem, says, "Neither wast thou washed in water, nor salted with salt, nor swaddled with flax." Some Oriental tribes which have now abandoned the old custom are called "unsalted," and are despised by their neighbors.
