SURVEYS ARE COMPLETED THROUGH NEW BRUNSWICK

And When Plans are Finished Two Months Hence Tenders Will Be Called For—No Clue to the Route—Last Harvester's Excursion Leaves St. John Today and Will Be Small as Season is Late.

ST. JOHN, Sept. 11.—(Special).—The work of surveying the alternate routes for the G. T. Pacific in New Brunswick has now been completed and the different parties are engaged in working on the plans and estimates, which will probably take six weeks to complete.

THE second and last harvester's excursion from the Maritime Provinces will leave St. John tomorrow.

As the great majority of the restless people in the Provinces went west on the first excursion and as the season is now well advanced the C. R. P. officials do not expect a very large crowd.

SAYS HE'S SON OF T. W. LAWSON

NEW YORK, Sept. 10.—It was learned tonight that a well dressed handsome looking young woman, who said she was Mrs. Alice Candes Bouquan Lawson applied to Magistrate Wahle in the west side police court this afternoon for a warrant for the arrest of her husband, Judson Willis Lawson, on the grounds of desertion and abandonment. She was represented by Lawyer Jacob Cebulsky of 271 East Broadway, who created a sensation by stating that Lawson is the son of Thomas W. Lawson, the Boston financier. The alleged young wife swore that her maiden name was Bouquan, and that her home was in Montana. In reply to Magistrate Wahle she said that she was positive Lawson was a son of the Boston financier. "Why," she spent three thousand dollars on me in two weeks," she exclaimed. According to young Mrs Lawson they were married on August 7th at a Baptist church in Providence, R. I. Magistrate Wahle granted the warrant.
