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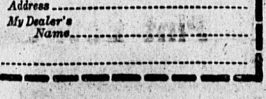

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Premier Stewart's Platform for the Coming Election

The recent increase of \$125,000 in Federal subsidy to this Province is we believe but a small part of what we should in justice receive. It will be the aim and duty of the Liberal Conservative party if returned to power at the forthcoming election, to so further present and press these claims that this Province will realize upon her rights in full measure.

Upon obtaining further financial relief as above to still further reduce taxation.

Agriculture:

Every possible assistance and incentive to the improvement of live stock.

Greater attention to agricultural education.

- (1) By suitable practical courses in Agriculture in Prince of Wales College. (2) By increasing short courses and night schools and carrying the same to local centers throughout the Province. (3) By local demonstrations and lectures. (4) Continued attention to and supervision of School Fairs and Exhibitions.

Promotion of and assistance to all Agricultural co-operative movements.

Further efforts to so adjust traffic rates as to assist the transportation of the agricultural products of this Province.

An endeavour to place fruit growing in its proper position among the branches of Agriculture in this Province giving, special attention to the extension of blueberry and cranberry cultivation.

Public Works:

The improvement of the secondary roads of the Province, giving special attention to roads leading to shipping centers.

The surfacing with hard gravel those portions of the road system which carry a large volume of farm and motor vehicle traffic and the development of the gravel pits of the Province so as to make use of local gravel where available.

Continued and adequate maintenance of the Improved Highways of the Province.

A continuation of the policy of replacing worn out bridges and culverts of wood with structures of concrete and steel.

In co-operation with the other Provinces of the Dominion to endeavour to have the Dominion Highway Grant re-opened.

Educational:

Upon further augmentation of the present revenues of the Province a revision upwards of the salaries of our public school teachers based upon quality of work and experience.

Carrying to completion arrangements already entered upon with the other Maritime Provinces for providing school texts of a higher and uniform standard at the lowest possible prices.

A real effort to bring back and re-habilitate in this Province those of our own people who can be induced to again take up farming.

An investigation of the water power possibilities of the Province with a view of supplying cheap electric light and power especially in the rural districts.

Continued and increasing attention to Public Health.

A study of the Federal Old Age Pension Scheme with a view of making it available in this Province if within our reach financially.

Assistance to the Fishing Industry similar in aim and extent to that now being furnished to agriculture.

The Repeal of the Prohibition Act and the enactment of a Temperance Law, the principal features of which will be:

- (1) The sale of intoxicating liquors only through Government vendors, stores, controlled and operated by a Commission appointed by the Government, to persons holding permits issued by the said Commission. Such liquors to be sold under official test and at a reasonable price. (2) Such permits to be issued to unobjectionable applicants over 21 years of age, and to be good for one year and to be non-transferable. (3) No consumption of liquor in public places. (4) Vendors' stores to be continued in the places where they are now open. No stores to be opened outside these places except after a majority vote of the municipality, townships of other large unit of population within which a store is proposed to be opened, upon a plebiscite taken for that purpose; such plebiscite to be granted upon a petition to the Lieutenant-Governor in Council signed by a representative number of electors on such municipality or township. New Vendors' stores thus opened may at any time thereafter be closed after an adverse plebiscite similarly taken. (5) The cancellation of permits of persons abusing the use of same by becoming intoxicated or offending in any way against the provisions of the Act or other Laws of the Province. (6) Greatly increased penalties for all violations of the law. In the case of illegal selling, the person purchasing liquors illegally to be prosecuted as well as the person illegally selling. (7) Rigid enforcement of the Law.

BOOTLEGGING UNDER GOVT CONTROL

Some of the Fallacies of Rev. Mr. McKinnon - Reason Not Idle Talk Wanted.

Rev. Mr. McKinnon made the statement on Sunday night that if Government Control carries here bootlegging will be greatly increased because while now the bootlegger has to buy his supply illegally then he would be able to buy supplies legally from the Government stores.

Almost in the same breath he said that Government Control would not eliminate the bootlegger because the Government would be at such expense in maintaining the stores that the bootlegger would undersell them. If, as first stated, the bootlegger is going to buy his goods from the Government stores at Government prices, how can he undersell the Government? This reasoning is about on a par with his whole address.

Much stress was laid on the increase in crime in Saskatchewan since Government Control became the law. Nothing was said of the increase of crime in the United States under Prohibition. Every one knows that a great crime wave has swept over the world in the last few years, and nearly every one knows that the great prohibition country—the United States—leads all Anglo Saxon countries in its crimes at a record per capita. Mr. McKinnon might have told many more interesting stories of looting, shooting and crime generally which filled the newspapers not so long ago in connection with bootlegging in Chicago.

Let us have sound reasoning on this subject and not idle talk.

The Knights of Columbus, Dorchester, Mass., have sent the bereaved family an engraved Chalice as a loving tribute to Billie's memory.

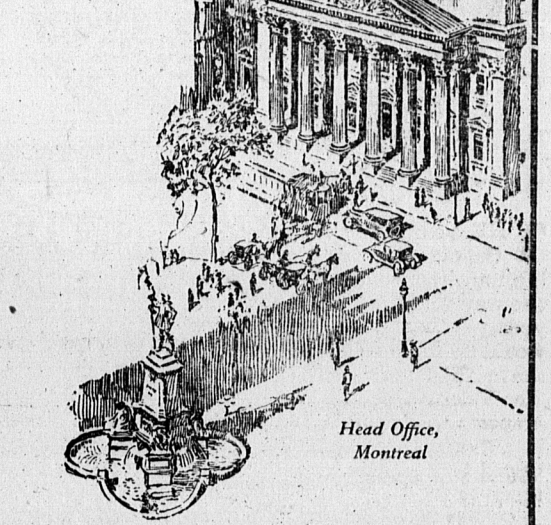
