KING'S COUNTY ALLIANCE

GEORGETOWN, Nov. 16.—At the annual meeting of the above Society on the tenth inst the following officers were elected for the ensuing year.

Pres.—Rev. F. A. Wightman, Montague.

The reports of officers for the past year showed good work done and the Treasurer's books show a good balance on the right side. The following resolution moved by Rev. R. G. Sinclair and seconded by Rev. A. J. McNeill, L. J. Wason, E. A. McPhee and William McLeod, Dan Ross and S. M. Martin were unanimously passed: Resolved that this Alliance (1) Expresses its deep regret that the prohibitory Act has become largely ineffective in Kings County. (2) Believes that the responsibility for this state of affairs rests principally upon the government of the day, which has appointed and sustains men in office either out of a sympathy with the Act or incapable of enforcing it. (3) Holds that no capable man can be obtained to enforce the Act until a sufficient remuneration be offered. (4) Holds that officers under the Prohibitory law should be appointed for their fitness, and not for their political leanings. (5) Request the candidates to declare themselves respecting the enforcement of the Prohibitory law. (6) This Alliance will place on record its high appreciation of the Provincial government and to believe that a united effort on the part of the government and temperance people that intemperance may be largely banished from this Province.

A resolution was also passed in regard to the procuring of legislation to prohibit the importation of liquors into this Province, and requesting that the Provincial government should join with the temperance organization in requesting the federal government to pass such a law. After the transaction of routine business the meeting adjourned to meet at the call of the board of directors, Rev. E. A. McPhee, Sec'y.

SEARCHING SON IN DALHOUSIE

Edward Smith Declares He Will Enlist Services of a Detective.

DALHOUSIE, N. B., Nov. 16.—One of the passengers from St. John to Dalhousie on Sunday morning was Edward Smith in search of his son Charles who was already reported in The Sun as located at Dalhousie by Policeman Seely. From early yesterday morning until a late hour this evening Mr. Smith has failed to find his missing son, although the fact is pretty well established that he is in some part of Restigouche.

A man named Charles Smith applied for work to the manager of the Dalhousie Lumber Company last week but did not engage with them. He spent a couple of days loafing in town and disappeared on Saturday. It is supposed that he went to Charlottetown or New Mills and a search is being made for him in the above two places and inquiries are being made in other parts. Ed. Smith when seen said that in view of the many contradictory stories about his son that he would return to St. John and send Detective Killen to Restigouche to locate the missing man.
