NEW YORK, March 29—Alvin MacAuley, President Packard Motor Co. sees automobile industry entering spring selling season in best position in years and with prospects sales will top year ago. Con'dent Packard sales will continue to show strong increase.

Graham Paige Motors Corp. stockholders to vote at April 10th meeting on increase in authorized common to 3,500,000 shares subsequently to approval 600,000 shares will be offered stockholders at \$3 a share on basis of one for four held. Funds to be used to retire notes and for additional working capital.

NEW YORK, March 29—Foreign exchanges are under pressure this morning again. The latest quotation on the franc would indicate that it is still above the gold shipping point. The latest quotation is 6.592. It is generally thought that shipments of gold will not begin unless the rate goes down to about 6.53. The best that can be said about yesterday's market is that volume was not large. However, its action was far

from impressive and we would look on again this morning. There will probably be considerable nervousness with the exchanges weak and the probability that Germany may give a definite answer to the signatories of the Locarno Treaty over the week end.

NEW YORK, March 29—Weakness in stock yesterday may be partially ascribed to weakness in some foreign exchange rates, but technically it seemed to be a move on the part of traders to take profits. Traders were rather heavy buyers of stocks in the morning trading Thursday and with no chance to get out Thursday afternoon and vitally diminishing on strength we remarked yesterday afternoon that they might have stocks for sale yesterday. The tendency to sell was probably encouraged by the possibilities of fresh developments in Europe over the week-end. The selling is likely to carry a little further, but without any unforeseen unfavorable developments it should not carry into any important setbacks. The trend of special stocks still seems upward based on improved earnings.

Drab Trading Session On Mt'l. Market

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)

MONTREAL, March 29—Drab trading kept prices near previous closes on Montreal Stock Exchange Saturday and the market closed slightly irregular.

Little more than 4000 shares changed hands in one of the duller sessions to date this year. Alternative buying and selling left utilities, constructions and metals mixed. Papers and liquors were steady.

Nickel turned over heavily, but after a few ups and downs finished unchanged at 48. Light selling brought a small loss for Noranda while Hollinger remained stationary.

A final buying spurt boosted Brazilian 1-4 to 12 1-4 and Power Corporation firm 1-2. Fractional declines ruled, however, for Shawinigan, Canadian Hydro-Electric preferred and B. C. Power "B."

Mild mid-session demand pushed Canadian Industrial Alcohol "A" up to 10 but the price later eased back to 9 3-4, unchanged. The "B" issue held a gain of the minimum fraction.

Widest gain was shown by Dominion Coal preferred, up a point at 16. Bank of Montreal led the downward issues with a drop of two points at 188. Other banks were quiet.

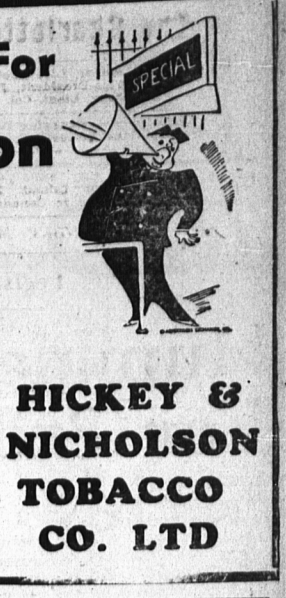

MINING

TORONTO, March 29—Toronto mining share market finished the week with a note of strength, showing chiefly in the gold group.

Pickle Crow was pushed up to the \$6 mark in a buying rush, helping to restore confidence to the rest of the group. Pickle Crow closed at 5.90 1/2, showing a net gain of 45 cents. The gold share index advanced more than a point and miscellaneous mines added 11.

There were no recessions among the big golds while moderate gains were marked up for Lake Shore and Little Long Lac. San Antonio made further recovery from the sharp decline early in the week to close at 25.2, a net gain of 18.

Interest was at low ebb in the base metals and oils. Noranda dropped the minimum fraction and Waite-Amulet and Ventures were off 2 to 3 cents each.

N. Y. Market Quiet Despite Gold Crisis

(By Frank MacMillan, Associated Press Financial Writer)

NEW YORK, March 29.—Faced with a new European gold bloc crisis, the stock market Saturday maintained a calm stand-off attitude.

While the French franc dipped well below the level at which the yellow metal can be shipped to New York at a profit, and allied currencies exhibited fresh weakness, Wall Street did not appear particularly alarmed or apprehensive.

Transfers totalled only 656,780 shares. The Associated Press average of 60 stocks managed to recover .1 of a point at 62.

The French currency fell to its lowest point since Oct. 4 last, but strong support appeared and it closed slightly above its bottom figure for a net loss of .00% of a cent at 6.58 1/2 cents. The pound sterling ended 1/4 cent easier at \$4.94 1/2.

Bonds were quiet and slightly irregular.

Stocks that got up fractions to a point or more included U. S. Steel, Westinghouse, Bendix, Chrysler, General Motors, Omnibus Corp., Yellow Truck, Douglas Aircraft, Simmons Co., Sears Roebuck and Curtiss-Wright.

Among issues on the losing side for as much as a point or so were Santa Fe, American Telephone, American Smelting Union Pacific, Standard Oil of New Jersey, Anacosta, and Consolidated Edison.

There was little activity in the Canadian list. Canadian Pacific, Hiram Walkers, Ford of Canada, Massey Harris showed losses of 1/4 to 1/2 while Imperial Oil and Canadian Marconi showed similar gains. Others were unchanged.

Canadian National Railways ATLANTIC REGION TENDER

Sealed tenders, addressed to the undersigned and marked on the outside "Tender to Frederickton Bridge" will be received up to 12 o'clock noon, April 8, 1936, for removal of wreckage of superstructure of Saint John River Railway Bridge, Fredericton, N. B., from river bed.

Tenders will be received on two following basis:

1. Contractor to remove steel and deliver to the Railway loaded on railway cars at either or both the South Devon or Fredericton terminals of the railways.
2. Contractor to remove steel taking full ownership of the salvaged material clear of railway property.

The contractor in either proposal to guarantee a date by which he will have cleared a channel to river bed two hundred feet wide approximately opposite old swing span and a date by which he will have cleared river bed of wreckage from shore to shore.

There shall be approximately seven-hundred tons steel in superstructure wreckage.

A general plan of the bridge as formerly existing may be seen at the offices of Regional Chief Engineer, Moncton, Division Engineers at Halifax, Charlottetown, Assistant Superintendent South Devon, and Terminal Superintendent, Saint John.

Tenders should be on a bulk sum basis for each proposal (1) and (2).

Tenders must satisfy themselves of present conditions by visiting the site or otherwise and assume full legal responsibility for all phases of the work.

Tenders will be required to submit with tender a security deposit cheque for five percent of tender price in the form of an acceptable bank in cheques of the Canadian National Railways drawn on a chartered bank of Canada, and in event of award of contract must be given a bond in the full amount of tender on a bonding company approved by the railway as security for fulfillment of work, all in form to be seen with general plan above mentioned.

Time to clear two hundred foot channel is an important factor affecting the award.

Tenders received after the time above given will not be considered and lowest or any tender not necessarily accepted.
