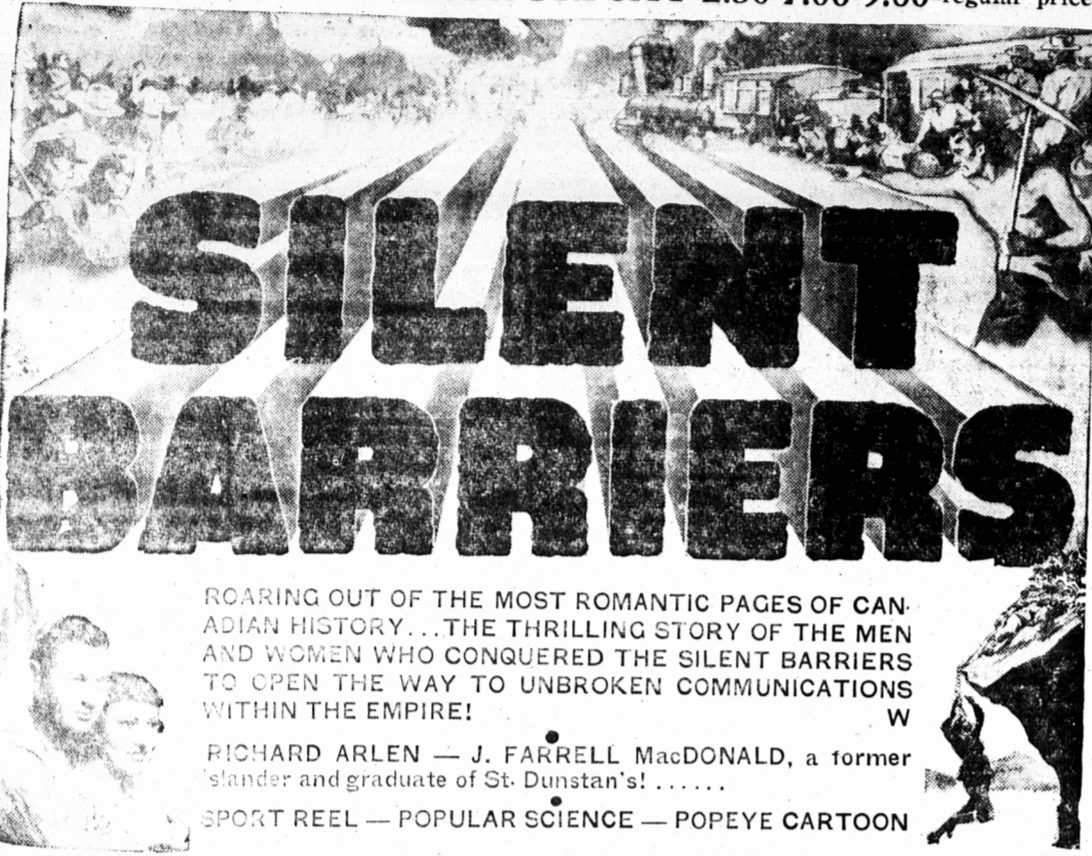

## Electrical Storm Causes Damage in Province

An electrical storm of short duration passed over Prince Edward Island yesterday morning causing some damage but failing to bring much relief from the heat wave. Lasting little more than an hour reports of damage by the storm came from Falkonwood Hospital where a wooden building known as the 'red house' was struck by lightning. A portion of the wall where a radio aerial entered was torn away. The radio was demolished, curtains were scorched and other damage occurred. At Earncliffe a large barn filled with hay, owned by Mr. Bernard Doyle was struck by lightning and destroyed by fire. Neighbours quickly gathered and attempted to save another barn nearby but the flames spread rapidly and the building was badly gutted. Some machinery was lost in the fire. Lightning struck a tree at the Belvedere Golf links which fell across some telephone wires. No other damage was reported by the telephone company. The Maritime Electric Company reported no damage. Mr. Warren Burns, meteorological official, Charlottetown, recorded 1.06 inches of rainfall during the storm. Previously only 1.13 inches had been recorded since July 1. Yesterday's temperature was the same as Tuesday's, 82 degrees.

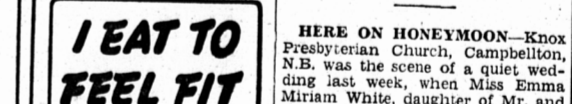

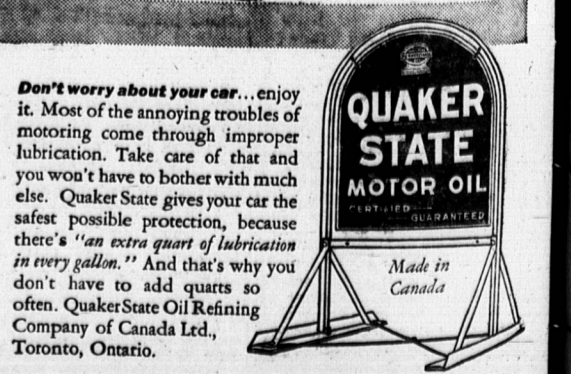
