THE U. S. SUPREME COURT DECISION.

The recent decision of the United States Supreme Court in regard to the duties on imports from Puerto Rico has been fruitful of discussion in the press of the Republic. There is no doubt the decision affirms the right of Congress to deal with the new dependencies, whether in the West Indies or in the Philippines at will and that Congress may make such customs tariff as it pleases between those countries and the United States. This has been claimed by Republican papers as upholding the policy of the President and his Cabinet. To some extent the decision does this, inasmuch as it upholds the right to acquire and administer new territories beyond the seas from time to time. In a word it upholds the expansionist doctrine as against all who oppose that policy. But on the other hand the decision strikes squarely against the pretension that the President possesses any extra-constitutional power in these matters. The decision in that respect decidedly takes away the power which had been claimed by and for the Chief Executive. President McKinley had by proclamation put into force a customs tariff in the Philippines. It would now appear that this action is invalid, and that those who have paid duties under the proclaimed tariff may receive them, back unless Congress, by ex post facto legislation declares the duties legal. For the power to make a tariff imposing duties is vested in Congress and not in the President.

In Italy members of Parliament do not receive mileage but are given free passes over all the railways in the country. The railway companies sum up the mileage and render an account to the Government at the close of the year for all travel by the members. Last year the total was \$9,056,374 lire, or about \$2,000 for each of the members of the two Houses, which shows that the public men of Italy are great travellers. It is stated that the Canadian members of Parliament also travel on free passes over the various railways of the country although the country pays them mileage for their attendance upon Parliamentary sessions.

If they travel by rail as much as the Italian members it is well that the Dominion is not required to pay the bills. For \$2,000 apiece for the 294 Commoners and Senators would make a total of \$538,000.

These are destroyed and rooted out by being first shattered with a charge of powder or dynamite. To reduce the cost to the settler the B. C. Government advertises that it will supply powder for this purpose to the Farmers' Institutes at cost.
