Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$100 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years. The area of cultivation is subject to restriction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

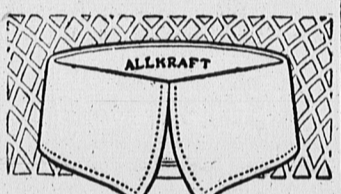

moment, by the most generous contribution that we as Canadians can possibly offer. Instead of that, we see honourable gentlemen going up and down and closeting themselves together for the preparation of an amendment; we see them devoting their entire time and energy, whatever it may be worth, to the political game instead of lending patriotic support to this measure. It is their funeral, honourable gentlemen, not mine. It is for them to understand and to realize whether they are doing the right thing or wrong thing. They know that they have nothing to do with the next election or with the time of the next election. They cannot say one word about it. And if they had anything to do with it, probably two-thirds of them would be licked out of their boots if they went before the people. In my opinion the important time for this Empire, the important hour for the Allies, is drawing nearer. We are drawing closer and closer to the hour of victory and of peace. Honourable gentlemen may say, "Well, then, why send more men?" As I have already said, in my humble opinion the time for the Allied armies to be strong is at the hour of the declaration of peace.

Speaking of elections, you want them, you are anxious for them; you feel that you have a solid Quebec behind you; you feel that you have every alien enemy in Canada would you; you feel that you have every slacker behind you; and you know that you have not a single loyal man behind you. You are figuring on that imported stuff that your Government scattered over this country of ours fifteen or twenty years ago. You are appealing to them. The good Canadian is to go down. The real fighting man is at war. Thirty odd thousands of them re in graves in Flanders and cannot vote. You have figured it all out. I can see the dark pencil. I can see you making the marks; I can see you scratching it on the paper; so many dead ones that cannot vote. But what a reputation you are making for the party

that existed at one time and of which you were a member, the great Liberal party of Canada. Do honourable gentlemen opposite represent that party? I do not believe it. I do not believe that the opposite side of this House as it is constituted represents the absolutely loyal Liberal people of Canada, not five per cent of them. Honourable gentlemen may laugh and giggle. Fools laugh when they are in a fool's paradise. I went through my part of the country the week before last. I did not call upon any Conservatives; I called upon leading Liberals, to whom in the past a visit from me would have been like the red rag to the poor old bull we have all heard of. I called on those gentlemen to ascertain their views. They are leading men, qualified to occupy any position, social or political, in Canada. It was with no introduction that I called. I want to say in all sincerity that not a solitary one of those gentlemen is ready to back up the sentiments that have been expressed from the other side of this House, not one. If any honourable gentleman does not believe my statement, let us take the morning train, and let him come home with me; and we will go and see those persons and find out from them what are the sentiments of the English-speaking people of the province of Quebec. Those men have, so far as I know, always voted Liberal.

Under these circumstances what do you think you are doing? Why are you wasting time? Whom are you following? What are you after? You are after a solid Quebec. You are after the disloyal element of Canada; you are attempting to put into power the enemies of the British Empire, the enemies of the Allies who are fighting for our liberty.

Much has been said about the so-called Nationalist party of the province of Quebec, and an effort has been made by every speaker of French-Canadian origin to impose upon the Government of the day the responsibility of having associated with the Nationalist party of Quebec. Well, honourable gentlemen, I will not say that to a certain extent that was not true. We were fighting in 1911 for what? We were fighting a commercial fight, not a European war; but we were fighting for the integrity of Canada just the same. We discovered, so they say, and they must be right or they would not say it—that Mr. Bourassa was disposed to lend his influence for the destruction of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. In my humble opinion it was Bourassa's opportunity, as he saw it, to gratify his ambition to become a greater man inside the Liberal party, who have always gathered around the Nationalists in our province; than Sir Wilfrid Laurier. There has been a time—some one snickers over there. Let me say to that snickerer that history is behind my statement, absolutely behind my statement. As I said this afternoon, the first Nationalist Government we had was under the Hon. Mr. Mercier, who ran the province until he could run it no longer; he ran it into debt, and everywhere else until he could not even borrow money—he could not get a mortgage of \$4,000,000 for 25 per cent. Then he went out and other people came in. Mercier won his election on what? On a war measure. He won it on the question of the Riel scaffolding. The hanging of Riel is what put your Liberal party into power with Mercier as its leader.

Hon. Mr. CLORAN: That is correct, Hon. Mr. POPE: Now, honourable gentlemen, they propose again on a war measure to use the bloody key with which they can unlock the door of Parliament. Could you find anything more consistent in this world? I want to compliment them. I have known them for years, and this an opportunity, a rare opportunity, for me to find myself able to compliment them upon their consistency, and I do so here and now, right on the floor of this House.

Now, honourable gentlemen, what is the thing called Nationalism? Hon. Mr. CLORAN: The honorable gentleman ought to know.

Hon. Mr. POPE: Oh know? No man knows better, because they are all branded; you can distinguish them. I will tell you why they are branded; because you dare not trust them in the open range without having a brand on them. They are all branded.

The first step towards Imperialism that was taken in Canada was Confederation. Thank God, Sir George Etienne Cartier, and not Sir Wilfrid Laurier, led the province of Quebec, at that time and led them into Confederation. Confederation was the basis of Imperialism. The anti-Confederationalists are today the anti-Imperialists; today they are frightened of a broader Imperialism because they believe themselves to belong to a separate nation under the same flag.

Sir George Etienne Cartier had his trials, but he was not one of those suave leaders appealing to the delicate feelings of the people. He led the French Canadian people. And you men, you founders of the Nationalist party in the province of Quebec,

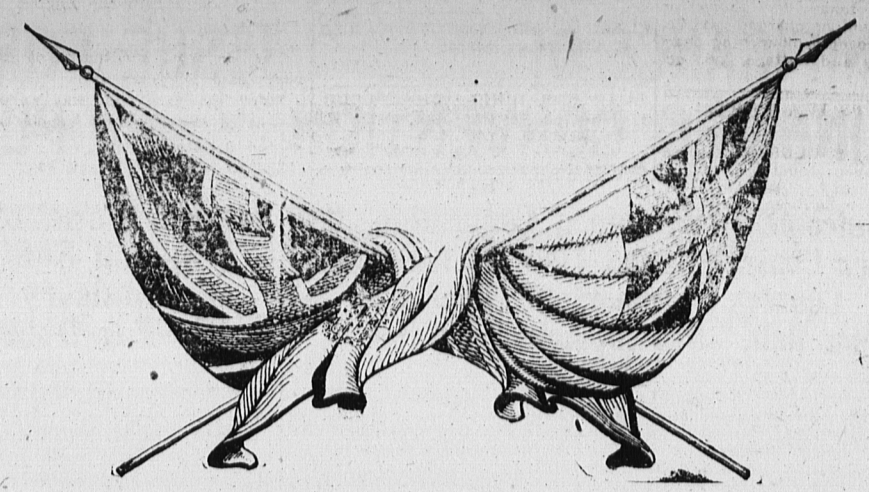
