There were about 150 delegates present at the meeting of the Grand Orange Lodge of P. E. I. which met in Summerside yesterday. The first session began at 2 p. m. and the evening session at 7:30. A special train which arrived at 12:30, brought the delegates from the east. The lodge was in session until an early hour this morning.

A meeting of the Farmers' Institute of Lot 18 and Lot 19 was held in Hamilton Hall on the 8th inst. The meeting was well attended by prominent farmers from both lots. Robt Agnew Esq presided. John Anderson and R. H. Montgomery were to have read papers touching on the dairy interests of the Province, but owing to their unavoidable absence their place was filled by Mr Agnew, who at the request of the meeting delivered a good practical address. He thanked the institute for choosing him to represent them at Truro, N. S. last April and then explained the course he took up there, going into each subject in detail. Questions touching the subjects referred to were asked at the close of the address and answered to the entire satisfaction of all. Wm. McNeill Simpson expressed himself as highly pleased with Mr. Agnew's address and spoke at length on farming in general. He stated that he was familiar with many parts of Canada and United States but was firm in his belief that P. E. Island as a farming province stands unrivalled and unexcelled. Robt B. Easter followed and advised farmers to join the institute, as with good co-operation they would be in a better position to obtain anything they demanded. He also made some good suggestions relative to successful institute work. John H. Woodside was delighted with Mr. Agnew's address; he asked several questions regarding rotation of crops, varieties of corn, method of planting etc and was promptly answered by Mr. Agnew. John A. L. McElellan moved and R. B. Easter seconded a vote of thanks to Mr. Agnew which was unanimously carried and suitably acknowledged. Meeting adjourned.
