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LABOR CRISIS THREATENING LONDON FOOD SUPPLY

Jim Larkins, Who Engineered Strikes in Ireland Said to be Back of the Present Serious Situation.

(Special to The Guardian) LONDON, July 4.—Is Jim Larkins behind the great dockers' strike now spreading through London and threatening England's food supply? This hour and daring Irish leader called similar strikes in the ports of the Irish State two weeks ago, which were not wholly successful, but are still continuing. Many of Larkins' followers, after his departure for America, found employment. In English ports where he had been preaching Larkins' doctrine, they had been closely co-operating with him since his return from Ireland. Union officials have

Miners are apprehensive that the ship may be used to pump the mines as was done at the time of the great British coal strike in 1922 when naval ratings manned the pumps of the English colliery.

Lost Caraque To Be Replaced

(Special to The Guardian) HALIFAX, July 4.—The royal steam packet liner Caraque, which went ashore June 25 on reefs about twelve miles from Hamilton, Bermuda, will be a total loss and will be replaced on the Canadian-Bermuda and West Indies route by another steamer. It was stated here yesterday by John Hulbert, general agent in Canada of the Royal Mail Steam Packet Company.

British Warship Will Fire Salute

(Canadian Press.) NEW YORK, July 4.—In connection with the celebration of Independence Day the British warship, H. M. S. Curlew, will fire salute in honor of President Harding at Portland, Oregon. For a British man-of-war to celebrate the Fourth of July by saluting the President of the United States is believed to set a precedent.

Hon. Dr. Tolmie Get New Appointment

(Special to The Guardian) OTTAWA, July 4.—Hon. Dr. S. F. Tolmie, M. P., former Minister of Agriculture, has been appointed to the executive committee of the Conservative party for the Dominion. This committee is in charge of organization work. The remaining members have not yet been announced.

Maritime Champion Defeated by Scarborough Golfer

(Special to The Guardian) MONTREAL, July 4.—G. C. Meikle, Maritime champion, was eliminated in the second round of the Canadian amateur golf championships by G. P. Shaw, Scarborough seven and six at Kanawake today.

8,000 Miners Walked Out in Sydney, N.S.

SYDNEY, N.S., July 3.—The 8,000 coal miners of Cape Breton had quit the pits at midnight tonight in support of the striking Sydney steel workers and to force the withdrawal from the Sydney strike area of the provincial police and federal troops now camped in the Empire Steel Corporation and maintaining law and order.

Labor Leader Defends Trust

(Special to The Guardian) LONDON, July 4.—The novel spectacle of a Labor leader defending London's largest trust was seen today, when in conference with the National Railwaysmen J. H. Thomas bitterly condemned the private omnibuses which are endeavoring to compete with the existing combine between regular buses and the underground railway.

President of Gaelic League Imprisoned

O'Brien, President of the Gaelic League in London, and five colleagues, who were released from internment in Ireland under court decision, up setting regularity of their deportation from England, were found guilty of seditious conspiracy. Art. O'Brien was sentenced to two years and the others to one year each.

DEMPSEY STILL WEARS THE CHAMPION'S BELT

In Fifteen Spectacular Rounds the Challenger, Tom Gibbons, Held His Own, Giving and Receiving Punishment. Decision Was Awarded Dempsey on Points.

Jack Dempsey, was awarded a champion's mid section as they fifteen round decision over Tommy Gibbons, St. Paul, Minn. Jack dug a hard right into Tom's stomach. He one of the most surprising upsets landed another right to the same in a heavyweight match in years. Gibbons was on his feet, apparently very tired, and holding on desperately when the fifteen round battle ended.

Round Five. Dempsey missed a left to the body as they fell into a clinch. Gibbons poked two light lefts to the head. Dempsey missed a left and Tom clinched. Gibbons hooked two lefts to the head and the crowd cheered.

Round Six. Dempsey's left was short in a clinch and referee Dougherty was forced to go between them. Gibbons danced away from Dempsey's leads in the clinch. Dempsey hit Tom on the chin with short rights. Gibbons clinched. Gibbons backed away covering up from Dempsey's onslaught. Dempsey hooked a left high to the head and backed Gibbons into the ropes in a clinch. Dempsey hooked two lefts to the head. Gibbons missed a right swing to the head. Gibbons persisted in clinching and when free ran away from the champion.

Dempsey swung two lefts and a right to the head. Gibbons ducked a right to the head. Gibbons covered up to evade Dempsey's rushes. Gibbons was trying quickly and seeking protection of clinches from Dempsey's vicious rights and lefts to the head as the bell sounded, ending the round and the fight.

The result was distinctly a surprise as Dempsey was an overwhelming favorite in the measure getting to win by a knockout within six or seven rounds. The game Gibbons astonished even his most ardent supporters by carrying the fight to the hard hitting Dempsey in some rounds and out boxing him in spots. Dempsey outstaged Gibbons and landed the hardest punches always trying desperately to whip over a knock out punch. When the battle ended Gibbons was tired and rapidly fading from the cruel punishment that Dempsey inflicted around the body. The challenger hung on constantly in the fifteenth round to avoid a knockout punch. A tabulation of newspaper expert at the Ringside gave Gibbons a share in the fifth, eleventh and thirteenth rounds while Dempsey was out in front in the remaining twelve.

RINGSIDE.—Dempsey's face was heavily smeared with vaselin when he appeared in the ring, and when a lay's growth of hair Gibbons came into the ring five minutes later, and was accorded more dactering reception.
