HALIFAX, Sept. 30 — (CP) — Governor General Viscount Alexander and Lady Alexander drew close to the end of their Maritime tour today with a sightseeing visit to history-stepped Annapolis Valley which saw them pass through Grand Pre, Windsor, Hantsport and Wolfville en route to Kentville.

In the heart of the Land of Evangeline at Grand Pre the vice-regal couple was conducted on a tour of the Memorial Park and later viewed French-Canadian relics of Nova Scotia's pioneer days.

The Governor General set a precedent at Wolfville when he became the first Canadian Governor General to visit the town without stopping. Many Wolfville residents were put out because the vice-regal party did not stop there. Their Excellencies made a brief stop at Upper Dyke village north of Kentville where they visited the Governor General's first cousin, Mrs. Bredin Delap and Cmdr. Delap, R.N. (retired).

Lord Alexander won the hearts of the youngsters at Kentville when he declared a half-day school holiday.

Their Excellencies were tendered a luncheon at Kentville by Mayor Gladys Porter and were guests of Lieut.-Gov. and Mrs. Kendall in Windsor before returning to Halifax.
