It is to our everlasting discredit that the liquor trade also has said, "Without the help of the church people, our trade could never have been brought back to legal standing." But it is a poor rule that won't work both ways. The liquor trade could not remain in public respect, or even its existence tolerated, till tomorrow noon if the church people would unite against it.

paid mostly \$12.50 with odd sales down to \$12.25. Winnipeg moved up to \$11.25 to \$11.35 and Calgary \$10.00 to \$11. Edmonton paid up to \$11. Prince Albert closed higher at \$10.70 to \$11. Moose Jaw \$10.75. Regina \$10.75 to \$10.95, Saskatoon \$10.70 to \$10.95 and Vancouver \$8.80.

The Toronto lamb market opened 50 cents higher on westerns at \$11.50, with two cars at \$11.60. Spring lambs however, continued slow up to \$12 each. Montreal paid a top of 10¢ per head on spring lambs, while the high at Winnipeg was \$12 on a small supply, Calgary \$11.50 and Edmonton and Saskatoon \$8.50.

The Wool Market Quotations for the various grades of Eastern Domestic wool delivered at registered wool warehouses and woolen manufacturing mills in the provinces of Ontario and Quebec during the past week have been as follows:— Medium Staple 26 cents to 29 cents per lb.; Low Medium Staple 26 cents to 28 cents per lb.; Staple 27 cents to 29 cents per lb.; Coarse 28 cents to 30 cents per lb.; Grey and Black 17 cents to 20 cents per lb.; Seedy and Chaffy 15 cents to 17 cents per lb.; Cot's (Soft) 17 cents to 20 cents per lb.; Cot's (Hard) 16 cents to 19 cents per lb.

A considerable volume of wool has been marketed in Western Ontario and movement is beginning in Eastern Ontario and Quebec. The Maritime Provinces shearing has started. Prices are reported as follows:— Medium Staple 28 cents to 30 cents per lb.; Low Medium Staple 28 cents to 29 cents per lb.; Low Staple 27 cents per lb.; Coarse 27 cents per lb.; Grey and Black 25 cents to 28 cents per lb.; Seedy 17 cents to 17 cents per lb.

In Manitoba shearing is getting under way small lots are coming forward to warehouses. Shearing will become more general when seeding operations are completed. Opening price quotations for Western Domestic Semi-Bright grades are reported as follows:— Medium Staple 25 cents to 23 cents per pound; Low Medium Staple 23 cents per lb.; Low Staple 21 cents to 22 cents per lb.; Coarse 23 cents per lb.; Grey and Black 17 cents per lb.; Seedy and Chaffy 15 cents per lb.; Cot's (Soft) 18 cents per lb.; Cot's (Hard) 17 cents per lb.

CATTLE MARKETS TORONTO disposed of 5,212 cattle. Weighty steers were slightly lower at \$8 to \$8.85 with small lots of choice up to \$9.25. Butchers were steady and active at \$7.50 to \$8.75 and \$9. Cows had a range of \$5 to \$7.50 and canners and cutters \$3 to \$4.75. Bulls were \$6 to \$7.25 and \$7.50 fed calves \$9 to \$10, light western stockers \$7 to \$9.25 and some good feeding steers up to \$8.65. Milkers and springers continued steady at around \$90 for tops.

MONTREAL had an active market with a run of 2,111. Good steers sold at \$8.75 to \$9, a few making \$9.15, mediums \$7.50 to \$8.50 and common \$7.25 down. Baby heaves were quiet at \$8 to \$9, butcher heifers mostly \$7 to \$8.50. Cows topped \$7.50, generally \$6.75 to \$7, canners and cutters mostly \$4 to \$4.50. Milch cows ranged between \$45 to \$100 each.

WINNIPEG had a light run of 2,206 on a fairly strong market. Good heavyweight butcher steers were \$8 to \$8.75, tops \$9, butcher heifers \$8.25 down, well finished big steers topped at \$8.75, most bids \$8.25 down. Cows made \$5 to \$7 and bulls \$6.75 to \$6.75. Good fed yearlings \$9.50 to \$9. Light stocker steers \$7 to \$7.50 with ordinary \$6.50 down.

CALGARY sold 1,610 cattle with the best of the light and medium weight butcher steers \$7.75 to \$8.50. Top heaves 25 cents to 50 cents less. Good fed calves were \$8.25 to \$8.50, tops \$8.75, good cows \$6.25 to \$6.75, tops \$7, others down to \$4.50, and canners and cutters \$3 to \$4. Stocker steers and calves rated \$6 to \$7.75.

EDMONTON had an active market with 1,156 cattle. Heavyweight butchers traded active and steady but heaves closed 25 cents lower. Practical tops on light steers were \$8.25, an odd \$8.50, few heaves \$8, cows \$6.25 with an odd \$6.50, and stockers, a limited supply, \$6.50 to \$7.50, with a few \$7.75.
