**NORMAN WRIGHT LOWTHER**, of Kensington, enlisted in Charlottetown in the 6th C. M. R., went to France with the 5th Siege Battery, and saw service at Plogastree, Messines, Ypres and the Somme. He was wounded slightly at Ypres and severely at the Somme, where he lost his left leg. He returned to Canada Easter Sunday, 1917. Before leaving

the Island, Sgt. Lowther was principal of Kensington High School and is now Public Representative under the Military Service Act.



**PTE. AENEAS MCAULAY**, 55th Battalion, was awarded the Military Medal "for carrying wounded to shelter under heavy fire from May 20th to May 24th, 1916. This Medal was presented to his mother, Mrs. Ferdinand McAulay, Cardigan, in January last by His Honour the Lieutenant Governor.

**ISLAND'S DISTINGUISHED SONS**

**KNIGHTHOOD**

**MAJOR SIR ANDREW MACPHAIL**, Kt., Orwell, received Knighthood in recognition of valuable services rendered in France and England in connection with the organization of the Canadian Army Medical Service of which he was Deputy Adjutant Surgeon General.

**ERNEST FREDERICK JARVIS**, C. M. G., Assistant Deputy Minister of Militia and Defence, and Secretary of the Militia Council, born in St. Eleanor, P. E. I., son of the late Dr. Henry Fitzgerald Jarvis, had the honour of Commander of St. Michael and St. George conferred upon him in recognition of his valuable services in organizing overseas forces.

**DISTINGUISHED SERVICE ORDER**

This decoration is highly and justly prized by all red blooded soldiers and won only by the red blooded. The Order was instituted by Her Majesty Queen Victoria in 1886 and until the present war its membership was comparatively limited. Out of the millions of men engaged in the World War not a few have gained the coveted distinction. Of these the number of Canadians is in more than a creditable proportion. Among these are the following Prince Edward Islanders whose record in the war is indicated by the honoured decoration.

**WINNERS OF MILITARY CROSS**

**LIEUT. JAMES GERALD KELLY**, youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. James Kelly, No. 18 Kent St. Charlottetown, was awarded the Military Cross, and now wears the coveted ribbon. Lieutenant Kelly enlisted in the 105th Battalion, D. Company, in this city and proceeded with them to Valcartier. Unfortunately he was not permanently attached to this battalion, and was thus unable to go overseas with them. In September of the same year—1916—however, he proceeded overseas with a draft of seventy officers, leaving Halifax. The lieutenant has now been at the front over a year, attached to B. Company, 26th Battalion—"The Fighting 26th." On the 7th of May last, in a raid of the German trenches, Lieut. Kelly acted with exceptional bravery and his gallant conduct won the Military Cross. Mr. and Mrs. Kelly have three other sons at the front. Sergt. Karl, with the 2nd Heavy Battery; Pte. "Ted" with the 20th Toronto Battalion, and Jack, a master engineer, in one of the American Engineer Companies.

**MAJOR R.H. McDONALD, C.A.M.C.**

Major R.H. McDONALD, C.A.M.C., (now Temporary Major) Donald Hugh McDONALD, C.A.M.C., "for conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty." One of our aeroplanes was shot down, the observer was wounded and pinned beneath the wreck. This officer and a bearer went out in full view of the enemy, who were shelling the machine and extricated the wounded man and removed him to safety. He himself was severely wounded while doing so. Major McDONALD, for this service received the Military Cross. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. D. H. McDONALD, North Bedouque.

**WINNERS OF MILITARY MEDALS**

**LIEUT. VICTOR MORRIS**, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Morris, Summerside, enlisted in 1915, with the 105th Bat-

tallon. He took part in a number of engagements, and was wounded and for his gallantry and devotion to duty was awarded the Military Medal. He was invalided home and is at present at his home in Summerside.

**LIEUT. FRED DONALD**, went overseas with the 2nd Heavy Battery. Was twice recommended for D.C.M. which he received in 1918. He displayed great gallantry during the fighting on Sanctuary Wood. He has since received his commission in the Canadian Siege Artillery and is now serving the 11th Can. Siege Battery, France. His home is in Alma, P. E. Island.

**LIEUT. W. L. JENKINS**, son of Mr. J. F. Jenkins, Alberry Plains. Awarded the Italian Bronze Medal from the King of Italy for bravery on the field; also the Military Medal in recognition of valuable services. He enlisted with the 98th and is now in No. 2 C. S. B. When a Sergt. he had the enviable distinction of receiving his commission as Lieut. on the field. Another son, Private John Russel, of the Railway Construction Corps and a son-in-law, Pte. Irving Beaton are serving at the front, the latter in the U. S. Army.

**QUARTER MASTER SERG. JAMES J. WILSON**, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Wilson, of Southport, P. E. I., received the Military Medal March, 1917. He has been in the trenches nearly four years and has escaped without a scratch. Was in all the severe engagements in the battles of Lens, Ypres, Somme, Vimy, Kemmel. He also received his service stripe. He is attached to the 26th Battalion.

**SGT. WILLIAM DAVID MCLURE**, son of Mr. Cartney D. McLure, Murray Harbor North. Awarded Military Medal according to official announcement as follows: "During the operations on the night of the 8th and 9th of July against four lines of enemy defences east of Ascension Farm, Sergeant William David McLure, Lord Strathcona's Horse (Royal Canadian) led a bombing party with great courage and skill clearing out several dug-outs and capturing a number of reserves. Award recommended Military Medal."

Sergt. McLure enlisted with the Royal Canadians during the early days of the war and has followed the fortunes of that Regiment ever since, being one of the very few original members still at the front. Although at one time completely buried he has not had a scratch to date.

**SERG. MILTON F. McDONALD**, D. C. M., M. C. Sixth Battery Canadian Division, France. He first received the D. C. M. for bravery at the battle of Courcellette. He also received the Military Medal for bravery at Hill 70. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. M. F. MacDonald, Belfast, P. E. Island.

**SERG. VERNON H. MCLEOD**, son of Mrs. J. D. McLeod, Hillsboro St. Enlisted in Major Power's Battalion immediately on the outbreak of the war going to England in Nov. and to France in February, 1915. Shortly after going to France he was made Corporal. In April 1917 he was awarded the Military Medal and in June 1917 was again mentioned in Haig's despatches for conspicuous bravery. With the exception of short furloughs to Paris and London he has been continuously at the front since he went to France. He has received his commission as Lieutenant.

**SERG. JAMES H. BRYANT**, son of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Bryant, Enmore, enlisted with the Strathcona Horse, awarded the D. C. M. Was wounded on May 29th, 1917, while doing the duty for which his decoration was given. A brother, Pte. William E. is serving with the 26th.

**LIEUT. ERNEST G. WEEKS**, son of Mr. W. A. Weeks, Charlottetown, enlisted Aug. 7, 1914 as a private joining Major Power's Battalion. St. John, N. B. Crossing to England in November 1914, and to France in Feb. 1915. Was promoted to Sergeant in England. Took part in practically all the engagements participated in by Canadians. In 1917 he won the Military Medal and later had a bar added. Early in 1917 he secured his commission as Lieutenant and was awarded the Military Cross. He was sent back to England early in 1918 where he served as instructor in signalling at the training depot at Seahforth. He is now in France.

**LIEUTENANT HUGH RONALD STEWART**, son of Mr. D.B. Stewart Charlottetown, enlisted as a signaller, went to France in February 1915. Won the Russian Order of St. George. He was recommended for a commission and later joined the Royal Air Force where he won the Double Wings as Pilot and Observer. He is now instructor in Aviation at Toronto.

**CPL. JAMES H. BRYANT**, son of Mr. J. H. Bryant, Enmore. Was awarded the Distinguished Conduct Medal for conspicuous gallantry and devotion to duty. With a bullet through his left shoulder and a shrapnel wound in his back, he carried on and led his men, only seven in number when at-

tacked by thirty Germans; taking in twenty-one prisoners, one of whom was an officer. Cpl. now Sergeant, Bryant is a member of the Lord Strathcona Horse. He was wounded in May, 1917, but fully recovered and went back in the line again and has been recommended for a commission.

**COPL. GEORGE GARDINER**, son of Mr. and Mrs. George W. Gardiner, Charlottetown, enlisted August 7th, joining Major Power's Battalion in St. John, N. B. After training at Valcartier went to France in November 1914 and went to France in February 1915. With the exception of a few weeks furlough he has been continuously at the front and saw all the battles in which the Canadians took part. Early in 1918 he won the Military Medal and later had a bar added. He has been promoted to Sergeant.

**CPL. A. S. STEVES**, left Charlottetown with the 5th Siege Battery, (now the 8th) and was awarded the Military Medal for carrying wounded under shell fire in Armentieres. His home is in River Glade, N. B.

**CORPL. J. JOSEPH SIMONS**, son of Mrs. John McKay Simons, Cable Head, awarded Military Medal for bravery in the field, April 1917. Enlisted at outbreak of war. Left Charlottetown for Valcartier August 20th, 1914. Crossed to England October, 1914. Crossed to France Feb. 12, 1915. Fought at Langemark and several other battles of that year. In June 1916 was wounded and after two weeks in hospital returned to duty. On June 6th, 1916, he was again wounded, this time severely in the arm, and was sent to England. In March 1917 he again crossed over to France, fought at Vimy Ridge and on May 3 was again wounded, a compound fracture of the left leg. After remaining in a hospital in England till Dec. 31st, 1917, he sailed for Canada arriving home January 14th, 1918.

**CORP. GORDON CAIRNS**, 8 Machine Gun Co., B. E. F., France was wounded in November 1917, losing his right arm and is now in England. Has won the Military Medal.

**LCE. CORPL. OTTO ALBERT DUNNING**, son of Mr. and Mrs. David Dunning, Granville, enlisted with the Ford Garry Horse, B. Squadron, awarded Military Medal "for bravery under fire which charged a party of whom 22 were taken prisoners."

**BDR. HAROLD I. LESLIE**, of the 8th Siege Battery, C. G. A., is a son of Mr. Geo. A. Leslie, Charnwood, P. E. Island. Following is a copy of the official statement made by General Jones when presenting the Military Medal. "Awarded to Harold I. Leslie, C. G. A., for bravery at Armentieres on July 17th, 1917, after the gun crew had either been killed or wounded, dressed and carried to a place of safety three of the crew, making three journeys under heavy shell fire. He displayed marked courage under most trying conditions. Bdr. Leslie was severely gassed on July 31st, 1917, at Armentieres and had to remain four months in Hospitals in England."

**BOMB. CLARENCE R. WHITE**, enlisted in Charlottetown with the 98th (now No. 2) Siege Battery under Major Prowse, won the Military Medal in Dec. 1917. He was recommended on three different occasions. Son of Mrs. Alberta White, 172 Prince St., City.

**BDR. M. C. STEWART**, 2nd Siege Battery, awarded the Military Medal for gallantry in action. He is still in France with the 2nd Siege Battery. His home is in Southport, P. E. I.

**BDR. ARTHUR WILLIAMS**, son of Mr. and Mrs. Albert Williams, 76 Elm Avenue, Charlottetown, enlisted with the 8th Canadian Siege Battery. Was awarded the Military Medal for devotion to duty under extremely difficult conditions. Of eight who were with him in a dugout four were killed and four wounded. He bravely remained with his wounded comrades dressing their wounds and actually saving their lives although under continual shell fire.

**BOMR. JULIAN KOUGHAN**, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Koughan, Vernon River, enlisted with 8th Siege Battery, Charlottetown and left for overseas in September 1917. Award-

ed the Military Medal for carrying despatches under heavy shell fire in Armentieres and was mentioned in despatches for conspicuous bravery. A brother Sergt. Frank Koughan is serving in France with the 6th Field Bdt., U. S. A.

**BDR. PERCY MCNEVIN**, who left here in 1916 with the 2nd Siege Battery won the Distinguished Conduct Medal. Bdr. McNevin is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Nell McNevin, Granville St. and won his distinction for conspicuous bravery on observation duty at Vimy Ridge. Before going to France Bdr. McNevin was a machinist in the P. E. I. works.

**GUN. ALEXANDER ROY MCKAY**, 98th Siege Battery (now No. 2), Canadian Artillery won the Military Medal for laying lines under heavy shell fire in Sept. 1916. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. Wm. J. McKay, Free-land, R. R. Conway.

**GUNNER F. B. CONRAD**, 2nd Can. Siege Battery, awarded Military Medal for gallantry on the field of battle. He is still with his unit in France. His home is in Sturgeon, P. E. Island.

**GUNNER H. H. SIMPSON**, 2nd Siege Battery, awarded the Military Medal for gallantry in the field. He is still in France with his Battery. His home is in Bay View, P. E. I.

**GUNNER EVERETT MCEACHERN**, 6th Siege Battery, C. E. F., son of Mr. and Mrs. B. McEachern, Hopfield, won the Military Medal for keeping up communication under heavy shell fire. He has not been wounded and is still on active service.

**GUN. GEORGE WALKER**, son of Captain James S. Walker and his late wife Eva Clark Walker, awarded the Military Medal. "Was twice wounded. A brother, J. Gilbert Walker, was awarded the D. S. O. He was killed in action June 13, 1916."

**PRIVATE J. LEON WORTHY**, is another Charlottetown boy who has won the Military Medal. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lemuel Worthy, of this city. He left here with the 8th Mounted Rifles in 1915. Previous to that he held a position with the Bank of Nova Scotia, in Charlottetown. Private Worthy won his medal for running the gauntlet in charge of an ammunition wagon drawn by two horses across a shell-swept expanse under a heavy barrage of 8-inch shells. He had orders to relieve the brigade but on reaching the lines orders were cancelled. At present Private Worthy is in a hospital in England suffering from the effects of gas received at the time of making this heroic exploit.

**PTE. SPURGEON WARREN LEARD**, 123rd Battalion C. F. C., Andover, Hants, England, was awarded the Military Medal. Went over with the 105th Battalion POW with the Can. Forestry Corps. He is a son of Mr. and Mrs. P. W. Leard, Alberton.

**PTE. H. RODGERSON**, 5th Inf. B. E. F. France, son of Mrs. Allan Rodgerston, Kinkora, won the Military Medal on September 26th at Courcellette.

**PTE. H. B. COMPTON**, of the 28th Battalion, son of the late John Compton, Bangor, enlisted in Regina. Was awarded the D.C.M. for conspicuous bravery on the 8th of October, 1917. Following is the official announcement: "The enemy exploded some mines and Compton was buried under the debris. Being dug out he at once volunteered to go forward as a member of the bombing party, and assisted in bombing the enemy from the crater in which they were advancing. He also assisted under heavy shell and machine gun fire, in digging out four men buried by an explosion, thus helping in saving their lives. Through the action his course resource and devotion to duty were most marked."

**MUST GIVE UP SUIT OF CLOTHES TO THE ARMY**

AMSTERDAM, July 31.—The German government has given "final notice" to the public to give up voluntarily at least one suit of clothes each to the war workers and the army. The failure to meet the demand will result in forcible requisition, and delinquents will be liable to imprisonment for one year and a fine not exceeding ten thousand marks.
