FICKSBURG OCCUPIED

More Casualties Reported—Gen Colville's Retirement Called For.

FICKSBURG RE-OCCUPIED.

LONDON, Dec. 29.—(Special).—The British have reoccupied Ficksburg, which was held by the Boers.

GEN. DELISLE'S SUCCESS.

MORE CASUALTIES REPORTED.
