COSTS \$30,000 A YEAR TO BRING UP ASTOR BABY.
NEW YORK, June 10.—The upbringing of John Jacob Astor, infant son of the late financier who went down with the Titanic, is costing more than \$30,000 a year, according to an accounting filed in the Surrogate's Court by the boy's mother and guardian, Mrs. Madeline Falmagne Force Astor.

The document sets forth that more than \$63,000 was spent in the support and care of the child in the first seventeen months of his life. Of this amount \$5,000 was spent for toys and nothing.

Mrs. Astor says that she has not charged the infant with any part of the rent paid on her summer home at Bar Harbor Me., nor for the cost of automobiles which they have used and of which, she adds, "he has received substantial benefits and with a reasonable portion of which expenses, as I am advised by my counsel, Mr. Gildersleeves, the said infant might properly be charged."

The figures given by Mrs. Astor all tend to show that the \$20,000 a year allowance which she receives from the proceeds of the \$3,000,000 trust fund left by her father is not sufficient to meet his expenses.

In fact, Mrs. Astor says, she spent \$23,639.33 out of her own funds on her son in addition to the \$40,000 allowed by the court, between the date of his birth, August 14, 1912 and December 31, 1914. The accounting in several places leaves the inference that an increase in the annual allowance would not be refused.

In one place Mrs. Astor sets forth that the taxes on her city home, at No. 840 Fifth Avenue, were \$30,000 in 1913, and \$33,000 for the year following, and that the expense of maintaining the establishment between the date of the infant's birth and December 31, 1914, amounted to upwards of \$90,000.

"If Denmark or Holland, or both, should cede those islands to Germany the United States would protest on the ground that it was in violation of the Monroe doctrine. Damaging Little, They Profit England by Inflaming indignation, Increase Enlistment—German Generations to Come Must Aton.

Despite the fact that the so-called aerial raids of the Germans are largely a bombastic demonstration, that it is possible for Germany to pay extremely brief visits under cover of darkness to unfortified British cities, the gain to the Germans is slight as compared to the damage their visits do their cause.

Statistics show increases in enlistment of Britons after each so-called raid, and it is easy to understand that Germany's uncouth conduct in her wanton attacks on the unarmed is merely crystallizing British resentment against Germans for a generation to come, as well as engendering a wholesome hate in the hearts of the British people, which will be reflected in the peace terms which will finally be agreed upon after Germany's decisive defeat.

While her yocmanry fight galantry, though ignorantly, her strategists bring the scorn of civilization upon her heads, and it is easy to understand that Germany's uncouth conduct in her wanton attacks on the unarmed is merely crystallizing British resentment against Germans for a generation to come, as well as engendering a wholesome hate in the hearts of the British people, which will be reflected in the peace terms which will finally be agreed upon after Germany's decisive defeat.

Be it soon or late, the day will come when under the flag of Great Britain terms of surrender will be dictated to Germany, whose representatives will attend that council circle to hear but not to be heard.

A serious defect of the Bryan treaties has been brought out more quickly than was anticipated. Had Germany agreed to sign such a convention (fortunately she did not), she could have appealed to it for an investigation of the Lusitania tragedy, just as she has done without it, and while the investigation was in progress she could have continued her submarine operations, disposing of each case in dispute with the United States in the same fashion.

There was a curious relationship between the Secretary and the foreign diplomats. He incurred their amused contempt by presenting those who signed his peace treaties with plowshares made at the Washington gun factory out of swords which he got from the War Department. Upon them is the inscription: "And their swords shall be beaten into plowshares."
