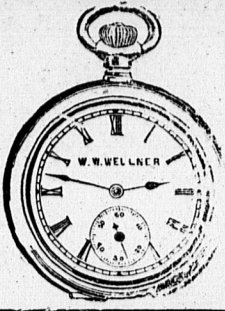

The report that Daniel Darrach, Canoe Cove, had the misfortune to break his legs some days ago, now proves to be untrue as he merely had them severely bruised and is now recovering as well as can be expected.

Under the heading "Forty-Two Today" the Ottawa Journal of Monday last contains the following: James Walter McNeill, M.D., M.L.A., (Hansby, Sask.); born West River, P.E.I., 1873; Liberal M.P.P. for Hanley since 1908.

The public auction of Albert Wise, North Wiltshire, on Wednesday last was one of the most successful sales of the year. Nearly five hundred eagre purchasers were in attendance and the bidding was brisk from start to finish. Everything sold well, special attention being given to the horses realising from \$150.00 to \$200.00 each, while cattle averaged about \$40.00 a head. The crop of course sold above market price on account of feed being scarce in this section of Queen's County. Mr. Wise leaves for the west in a few days, and expressed his satisfaction by the way the sale was capably handled by Messrs Ben Carter & Co., auctioneers. Messrs Easton Bros purchased a beautiful mare for \$200.00. The net proceeds amounted to \$3000.00.

W. H. Tidmarsh of Charlottetown, one of the successful fox ranchers of Prince Edward Island, is in the city. Speaking of business to the Record man last night, Mr. Tidmarsh said that the fox business was in a flourishing condition at present and that the prices for the season's stock are now ranging from \$6,000 to \$8,000 per pair, and that practically the entire young stock expected by the Island ranchers has already been sold. Last year prices in the London market were unusually high, one pet was sold by an Island man in London for \$28,000. This was the highest price ever received. Mr. Tidmarsh has been in the fox business for over three years, and has a large number of young black pups to dispose of this season, on which he expects to realize a good price in the English and Canadian markets.—Sydney Exe.

J.H. Winfield, General Manager of the Maritime Telegraph and Telephone Company, who has been attending the Annual Meeting of the Telephone Company of Prince Edward Island left yesterday morning on return to Halifax. Mr. Winfield stated that the Company had submitted a proposition to the Federal Government respecting the laying of a new cable across the Straits and that the Government had deferred action until they had ascertained how the people of Prince Edward Island felt on the matter. The Company asks the Government to buy the cable and lay it and then to lease it to the Company for a term of years, at a nominal rate, the Government to retain the ownership of the cable and to practically control it allowing another company the use of it as they see fit. The Company are to be allowed to charge 5c a message only for messages across the Straits. The cable it is estimated, will cost \$40,000 the interest on which would amount to \$1,600, for the Government, a very low subsidy compared with that paid to other companies. Mr. Winfield states it would cost the Government \$95,000 less than a company to lay the cable because they can save about \$12,000 in duty and the Government cable ship service could be used, otherwise it would cost about \$10,000 to secure the services of such a ship. The Company believes that if the cable was laid that a service of great advantage to business men in this province. Mr. Gears turned The Harvest 2.61 over to "Doc" Tanner a few days ago. Lou Dillon 1.58 1/2 will be bred to the futurity winner Atlantic Express 2.03 1/2. Very soon the two fastest American bred trotting stallions will be upon Russian soil. Native Bell (2.06 1/2) has a colt at foot by Justice Brooke (2.08 1/2). The future of this colt will be followed with unusual interest. This youngster combined the blood of two youthful champions mated so soon after racing. The oldest horse to enter the standard list in 1911 was the black pacing stallion The King who took a record of 2.21 1/2 at Warren O., August 31st. He was then 18 years. The writer saw the mighty Brazilian show better at the trot on one of our half-mile rings at the age of 21 years. According to the New Year Book there are now 71 different Alices with standard trotting records, 59 different Annes, 37 different Babies, 110 different Barons, 227 different Beles, and so many different Bessies, Billys, Bonnies, Carries, Charlies, Colonels, Generals, Princes, Kings, Ladies, Lords, Tomes and Tommes, Daisies, and Dandies, Dicks and Dollies and so on down the line that it would take a corps of expert accountants to cast them all up correctly inside of a week. Passing through Cape Traverse recently I should say this village and surrounding country was a home for speed. I meant to take a short cut across the river ice but in the end the trip was made long as I had to go away out around the bunch as mostly all the speed was turned loose. Jack Irving was there with some of his and letting on he was only boy riding at the same time the ice was being chopped lively by John's steed. I looked over the Tunnel Track horses which have wintered in fine shape. Kalol looks splendid so also does Kinarras, the Premier Stallions, Mammie P. was never so fit and Guss Commodore has also developed into a horse of substance and beauty. This horse had a lot of natural speed wearing no straps and a poor customer for the horse boot factories as he wore none. Cain said he was for sale but the purchaser must loosen the strings of his pocket-book pretty well. Frank Webster then turned for the record with a last bay pacer by Brillian 2:19 called Tryon Girl and has for a finished dam Old Administrator, Soladon and good old thoroughbred stock following in the rear. Her breeding is classy and I should say she is able to go up and stay with the best of them. P.S. Howat had Campbellton Bell going fast, Dominion D. was there too, neither of which forgot their early training. Geo. Heffel has purchased a nice sized bay pacer by Parkside whose dam is Brazilian. Space forbids mention of all the speed I saw, however special mention must be made of some colts. Herbert Lord's year and a half, Kalol pacer shows some class. Bert Dickie has a nice filly one year older by Tart 2:25 that looks good enough to go to the races with next season, but Gordon Dawson's colt, two and a half years, called Pure Gold, paces fast and will bid for the Maritime record of the age this fall. He turned down two hundred and fifty dollars, the bid of a King's County true sport. Com.

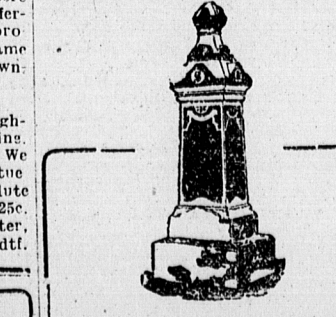
