MONTREAL, Que. May 16.—Increases in wheat prices were put into effect on the Montreal cash grain market today, Manitoba number six wheat being boosted four cents to 87 and feed wheat 2 cents to 77. Other grains and flour were unchanged. The butter market held steady with trading in small proportions. Receipts were 1175 boxes. Arrivals of Quebec grass butter are expected next week, the cattle being now out in pastures. Quebec butter received to date has all been fodder butter which demands lower prices than the full grass variety. There was no change in the egg market with arrivals keeping up a good volume and many eggs moving into storage. Receipts were 3542 cases. Cheese held firm with receipts at 1419 boxes. The trade was waiting to see what the country boards do tomorrow. Potato market was dull with prices holding unchanged.

DEPARTMENT OF INTERIOR ISSUES NEW HANDBOOK ON NORTHWEST TERRITORIES

OTTAWA, Ont., May 16.—(By The Canadian Press)—"The Northwest Territories 1930" is the title of an attractively illustrated handbook of 137 pages which the Northwest Territories and Yukon Branch of the Department of the Interior has just issued. This work is a concise compendium of general facts relating to Northern Canada and has been prepared to meet the rapidly increasing demand for authentic information concerning these regions to which so much attention has been directed recently through the exploits of aerial prospecting operators and the lifting of the Coppermine mineral reserve.

Accurate and up-to-date information is given respecting the extent, topography, population, resources, climate, transportation facilities and governmental organization of the Territories. A brief historical sketch is included and outlines are given of the expansion of the fur trade, the work of missions, the activity of prospectors and other undertakings. Particular references are made to recent exploratory and scientific expeditions carried out by officers of the Department of the Interior and of other government organizations. It is the policy of Hon. Charles Stewart, minister of the interior, to make known promptly and lucidly the results of these investigations, particularly those respecting the value and extent of the natural resources.

The economic situation of the Indians and Eskimos who inhabit those regions and the wild life, on which they are so dependent for their existence, are dealt with in considerable detail. The wild bison of Mackenzie District, the barren-ground caribou, the musk-ox, the fur-bearing animals, the fish and the aquatic mammals of Arctic waters are described. The government's reindeer venture is outlined and the story of the recent discovery of the nesting grounds of the Blue Goose is briefly narrated. The mineral possibilities are dealt with and the mining and prospecting situation is brought up to date.

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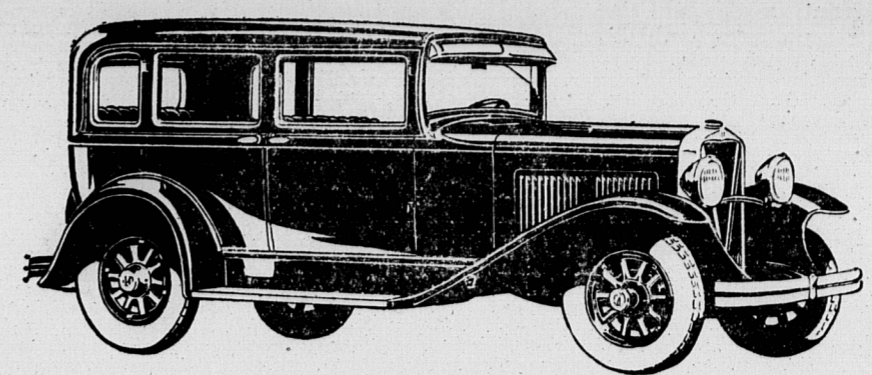
