HAIRDRESSING

The news that fashion has decreed bustles and wide hips and a distinct waist line is as nothing compared to the news that we shall also wear ears this spring! The carefully hidden ears, of the girl of 1913 will give place this spring to shell-like ones that show and cheeks that show too, for coiffures will be drawn high away from the face allowing its contour to be seen and only one or two little "kiss me quick" curls will adorn the temples.

Like most vogues this distinct change of hairdressing is the direct result of the exaggeration of what was really a very pretty and youthful style of the hair fluffed about the face. This originally simple arrangement was, however, carried to such extremes by certain types of girls that the more exclusive women revolted against it, and now hairdressers themselves have taken up the campaign and have decreed the high narrow coiffure of the coming season.

In most instances the hair will be drawn back in a semi-pompadour, though the side parting is still in favor, and the softly rolled knot on top of the head held in place with a high comb will be the most fashionable coiffure for evenings.

Jeweled pins and combs will be worn even more than during the winter, while the severity of the style of coiffure will necessitate waving and soft undulations at the back as well as the front of the head.

Powdered hair and powdered hair continues to be the rage in Paris, and is affected by some smart women here. Miss Mary Garden's photo showing how effective this style is with a beautiful face under snow white coiffure. The statistic of shipping, which have been submitted to the House of Commons, show that during 1913 there were 8,545 vessels on the Canadian register, at \$26,968,950. The total tonnage was 896,965 tons, and 43,946 persons were engaged in the marine service. Of the total number of vessels registered, 2,947 were steam, with a tonnage of 711,512. The value of new vessels, of which there were 344, added during the year, was \$2,892,280.

CORNWALL, V. M. S.—The Auxiliary and Mission Band met in unison on Thursday afternoon, May 7th. It was a very interesting session. Reports of the year's working and the election of officers for the ensuing year took place. Mrs. Pope Crosby, the amiable and efficient President for the past two years, presided. The newly elected President is Miss Charlotte Howard, an untiring worker, and it is confidently anticipated that the Auxiliary will continue to grow. Mrs. Samuel Drake, another earnest worker, was elected Recording Secretary; Mrs. George Orman, Corresponding Secretary; Miss Myrtle Boyle, Secretary Treasurer. Miss Elizabeth Crosby encouraged them by becoming a Life Member. Miss Fanny Boyle, the earnest and faithful leader of the Mission Band, was re-elected President and Mrs. George Orman elected Vice-President.

SHEEP-BREEDERS' LAWS.—The by-laws of the Sheep Breeders Association have been prepared by the Executive and approved of by the Governor in Council. The most important portion of them, so far as the ordinary farmer is concerned, has reference to the insurance of sheep against destruction by dogs. There are to be two classes of insurance—one for pure-bred registered sheep and the other for sheep not registered. Insurance in the first class is 3 cents per sheep and the compensation for loss shall not exceed \$15. For ordinary sheep, or those which have not been registered, the insurance is one cent per head and the compensation shall not exceed \$6. The Secretary-Treasurer of the Association is the Secretary of Agriculture, and he will be prepared to accept insurance fees, which include membership fees, within the next three weeks. The Constitution and By-laws is in the hands of the printer and will be distributed as soon as ready. Members of the Association are expected to send in the correct number of sheep owned by them accompanied by their membership fees, and they are also expected to exercise due diligence to protect their sheep from dogs. In the case of a sheep being killed, they must endeavour to find the owner of the dog or dogs responsible for the damage. If damage cannot be collected from the owner of the dog, the Association will make good the loss. Every claim, however, shall be finally decided by the President of the Association, the Vice-President for the County in which the claim shall arise, and the Secretary. It is the general opinion that this Association will meet a long-felt want.
