## Joe Dimaggio Tops Honors In Baseball

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Jan. 16.—(AP)—Joe Dimaggio probably doesn't need much argument to clinch his bid for the biggest salary increase this year of any player in the major baseball leagues.

It's the general belief, in fact, that the World Champion New York Yankees already have paved the way for a settlement by offering Dimaggio a \$22,500 contract, an increase of \$7,500.

Whatever the moves thus far to come, it's noteworthy news today that the San Francisco Italian has been voted the "player of the year" award for his 1935 performance by the Baseball Writers' Association of New York.

Joe will be one of the chief guests of honor at the 18th annual dinner of the Metropolitan Baseball scribes, Jan. 30.

Dimaggio the youngest player and the first sophomore to be voted the "player of the year." He is the fourth member of the Yankees to gain this distinction since the New York writers inaugurated the award in 1931 by naming Harold Terry of the New York Giants.

Ability to overcome Maroons leads brought the Red Wings their tie for twice Manager Tommy Gorman's Montrealers went ahead and both times Detroit came back to knot the count. About 5,000 watched the speedy game that had no being on the standings.

## Two Biggest Sport Plants Are Planned

LONDON, Jan. 15.—No keener struggle was ever waged on an English sports field than the present costly battle on the sidelines for supremacy in the sports promotion sphere between A. J. Elvin of Wembley and Brig.-Gen. A. C. Critchley of White City, native of Calgary.

Ultimate objective of both is said to be a complete sports plant capable of staging the 1944 Olympic Games or, if Japan should back down, the 1940 Games.

Immediate objectives are stands capable of accommodating an enormous money-making crowd. The Football Association will announce early in 1936 the venue of these profitable contests for the eight years after 1944 when overcrowded Wembley's lease expires.

General Critchley made the first move by announcing an enlarged scheme for White City which would provide accommodation for 160,000 persons. Elvin a week later announced he intended to go Critchley 10,000 better. His Stadium would be the biggest in the world.

Elvin holds the court cards because he has the present Football Association lease. But he wants the Football Association to take a share in financing the project whereas the Canadian plans to supply his own cash.

Each promoter has met the other step for step until London is probably the only city in the world that has two compact sports units of this colossal size.

At Wembley, besides the football pitch, there is a running and cycle track, greyhound racing track, speedway (motorcycle) track, the empire pool, for swimming, boxing and hockey accommodation, and the Palace of Arts for tennis, squash racquets and badminton.

White City has much the same setup with the addition of exhibition space. In conjunction with White City is the Harringay Arena where boxing, hockey and swimming are provided, and the Harringay Stadium for greyhound and speedway racing and athletics.

Opportunities for staging profit-making sports events are being limited with the increase of sports facilities. Two other big sports palaces are looking for a share of the spoils—Earl's Court and Olympia.

## Jackson Tallies Lone Goal As Bruins Score Initial Victory Over Canadiens

(By The Canadian Press) BOSTON, Jan. 16.—Young Art Jackson fired a third-period goal tonight and Boston Bruins rode through on it to a 1-0 win over Montreal Canadiens, the first victory of the National Hockey League season over the Frenchmen.

Jackson's payoff tally, with about 13 minutes of the game remaining, broke up a Canadian jinx that had extended through three games for the Bruins. Up to tonight, the best the Bruins had been able to do was gain a draw in one of their clashes.

The win kept Bruins out in front of the league's American section by a four-point margin as New York Rangers kept pace by beating Americans 4-0 at New York.

An overflow crowd of 16,000 saw the Bruins end the first half of the 48-game campaign with the hard-earned win. It was their 16th victory of the schedule to date.
