Liberals Have Majority In The Senate

OTTAWA, Sept. 9.—The proceedings in the Senate this afternoon witnessed the introduction of another new Liberal Senator, Hon. Jean Prevost, Senator Prevost represented Terrebonne, Quebec, in the last Parliament.

The introduction of Senator Prevost was the sixth for the day as Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, former Speaker of the House of Commons; Hon. J. H. King, former Minister of Finance and National Health; Hon. George Parent, former Liberal member for Quebec West; Hon. E. W. Tobin, former Liberal member for Richmond-Wolfe, and Hon. J. E. Sinclair, former Liberal member for Queens, P. E. I., were presented shortly after the noon hour.

Hon. L. A. Wilson is scheduled to come to the Capital within the next few days, when he likewise will be introduced.

The Liberals have a majority of four over all parties in the Upper Chamber. The standing is: Liberals 49; Conservatives 44; Progressives Senator Turritt, 1. Total 96.

William Cameron died at Kensington on August 23 after an illness of short duration caused by leakage of the heart. His funeral was held on August 25th. Rev. F. H. Williamson officiating. 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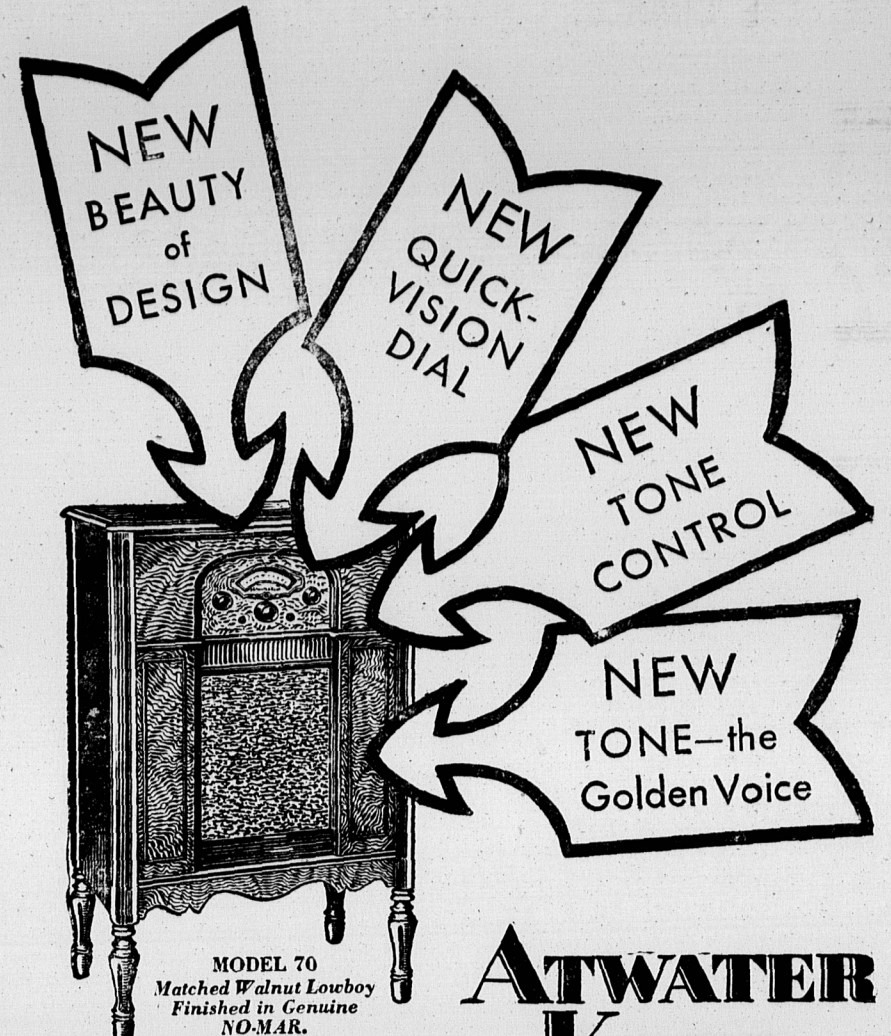
