### 500 AUTO SPEEDERS FINED IN NEW YORK POLICE COURT.

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—Violators of the automobile speed laws crowded the police courts yesterday. Nearly five hundred of them had been summoned to court in a crusade Saturday night and Sunday. In one court alone one hundred cases were disposed of during the forenoon. Fines averaging \$50 were imposed at the rate of one every two minutes. Three thus fined were young women. Of the men, many chauffeurs, without funds, had to go to jail for five days. The crusade against speeders was started in the hope of checking the increasingly high death toll claimed in the city by motor vehicles.
