### SPORT BRIEFS

BALTIMORE, Md., Jan. 4.—Charlie (Phil) Rosenberg, bantam weight champion, was given the judges' decision over Benny Schwartz of Baltimore, after twelve fast rounds here tonight. The local boxer was outclassed all the way. The men fought at catch weights with Rosenberg's title no at stake.

CHICAGO, Jan. 4.—Ed "Strangler" Lewis defeated Wayne "Big Munn" in their wrestling match here tonight in two straight falls. Each fall was won by means of three successive headlocks.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Jan. 4.—Jimmy King of New Orleans, won a technical knockout over Jimmy Cox of Memphis in the first round of a scheduled eight-rounder here tonight. Cox, with a broken jaw as the result of the haymaker lunged by King in the first stanza was unable to answer the bell in the second round. They are mid-dleweights.

### AT ROTARY

At the Monthly Meeting of the Rotary Club Monday evening the speaker was Miss Mona Wilson head Red Cross Nurse, who gave an address on the work which the Junior Red Cross is doing on behalf of crippled children. Miss Wilson made such an effective appeal that the sympathy of the club was at once aroused.

After she had left the meeting a subscription list was opened up, and a substantial sum was realized. A committee consisting of Fran Hutcheson, James Lightner, J. A. MacMillan, P. W. Clarkin and Gordon Hughes was appointed to arrange for the securing of additional subscriptions from Rotarians and to further assist Miss Wilson in her commendable work.

President J. A. Webster presided. The guests present were J. A. McIsaac of St. John and Dr. S. R. Jenkins, the latter delivering a brief address on the work of the Red Cross Society.

Rotarian Pendleton announced that the toboggan slide erected by the Rotarians for the benefit of the boys of the city was now in use at Brighton.

The President spoke of the regrettable illness of Rotarian Dr. H. D. Johnson who is still confined to his home.

Past District Governor George E. Inman referred to the death of Bert Adams, Past President of Rotary International, and paid a eloquent tribute to his worth and work.

The Chairman conveyed the sympathy of the club to Rotarian E. H. Shaw, who was recently bereaved by the death of his mother. Rotarian Shaw made a fitting reply.

Dr. S. R. Jenkins heartily commended the work of the Junior Red Cross and testified to the great benefit which crippled children had received.

He announced that it is expected that a sanitarium for tuberculous patients will be provided for the Island, in the course of a year or two. He also referred to the financial assistance given by the government, and by the Federal Life Assurance Officers' Fund.

Rotarian Dr. Houston also spoke of the splendid work of the Junior Red Cross.

President Webster told of the Rotary Clubs in various parts of the world were doing on behalf of the crippled children. In the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland a district to which the Charlottetown Club belongs, considerable activity was being shown, and the Rotarians of St. John's, Nfld., are getting behind the movement to erect a children's hospital in the city.

President Webster made a strong appeal to the Rotarians in behalf of the crippled children.

A general discussion took place in which Rotarians George DeBlou, J. O. Hyndman, J. W. Webster, E. L. Cotton, Vivian Dunbar, W. Chester McLure and others took part.

Dr. Houston said if children's wards would be established in the city hospitals, it might cost less than having the cases sent to Montreal. Dr. MacKenzie assured

## Syracuse Awarded Race For 1927

LEXINGTON, Ky., Jan. 4.—The New York State Fair at Syracuse was awarded the 1927 running of the Hambletonian Stake, premier trotting race of America, at a meeting of the Grand Circuit Stewards here late today. The date for the running of the stake was not set.

James I. Markey, secretary of the Hambletonian Society, who promoted the stake, which last year was worth approximately \$70,000 to Guy McKinney, the victor, said that \$8,000 was paid by the Syracuse officials to insure the running of the stake at their track this year. He said that all payments of eligibles for the classic had been received at the New York State Fair office and that the race would be at least \$70,000 again this year.

### SILVER BLACK FOXES SHIPPED TO SCOTLAND

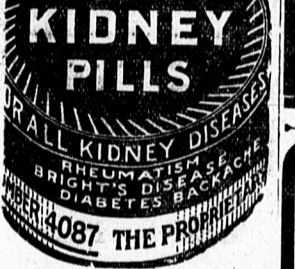
TORONTO, Jan. 4.—Six pairs of silver black foxes from the Agnew Farms at Barrie passed through Toronto last night on the way to Scotland, via the Canadian Pacific Express. J. B. Sutherland, foreign agent for the company, who handled the shipment, has during the last few years been instrumental in bringing the Ontario fur farmers in touch with European markets. Until quite recently all live foxes were sent from Prince Edward Island. He has also arranged shipments of rare specimens of birds, bears, emus, kangaroos and monkeys, across continents, and at the present time is interested in a unique shipment of a number of muskrats to Scandinavian countries. These animals will be shipped in their native Canadian haunts, and kept for a short time in semi-captivity before being exported.

It is the greatest difficulty to overcome in consignments of this nature is the very strict health law regarding quarantine, which necessitates inspection of the fox farms by British health officers before a permit of importation is issued.

### ABBE DELORME'S PISTOL STOLEN

MONTREAL, Jan. 4.—Abbe Adolphe Delorme's 25 calibre Bayard pistol, an outstanding relic of one of Montreal's principal causes celebres, has been stolen from its case in the museum of the medico-legal department of the morgue. With the Delorme weapon, went eleven other revolvers, representing the pick of the valuable collection gathered together by Dr. Wilfrid Doyenne and Dr. Rosario Fontaine, experts and autopsists attached to the coroner's court. The dozen weapons stolen were the most prized articles in the collection, nothing else in the museum being touched.

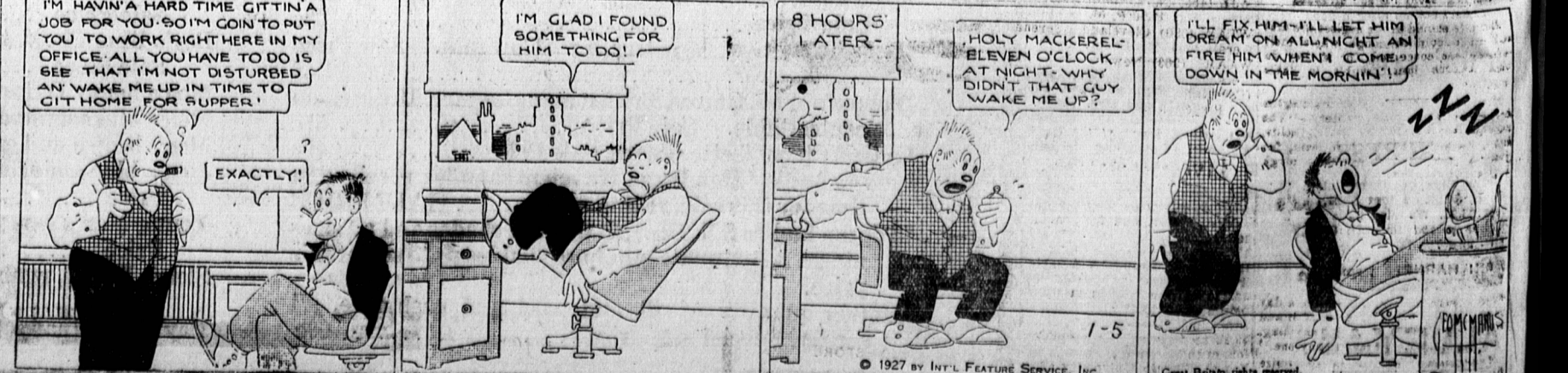
