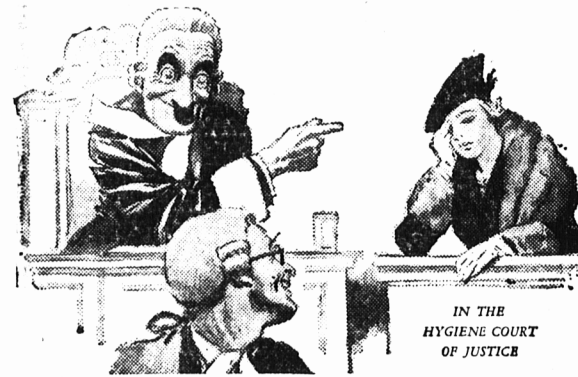

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CHILDREN, SAVE THE COUPONS

U.S. FISHERMEN PLEAD TARIFF PROTECTION

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire)
 WASHINGTON, April 9 — Representatives of the New England fishing industry, appealing for tariff protection in a revised trade agreement with Canada, told United States Government experts today the industry's fleet was an important auxiliary in national defence.

Edward H. Cooley of Boston, representing the Massachusetts Fisheries Association, said the New England industry had 900 to 400 trawlers which could be converted into mine sweepers in time of war. "A reduction in the tariff on fish by crippling this industry would be a blow to our national defence," Cooley said. He added that the United States Government commanded the fishing vessels during the Great War.

He said in the event of an emergency the United States navy probably would protect the Canadian coastline, referring to Canadian demands for a reduction of fish duties, he added: "It seems to me nothing could be more foolish than for Canada to jeopardize her own defence."

Cooley declared tariffs should be raised against Canadian fish imports rather than lowered. He said Canada had taken the market away from the American industry in salt and smoked fish and now was seeking to control the market in frozen filets.

He said because of lower wages and production costs, Canadian fisheries were able to compete in the American market even with present duties.

Dr. Haden F. Taylor, of the Atlantic Coast Fisheries, Incorporated, New York, said Canadians do not need a lower duty to compete in the United States market. He said Japan constituted a greater, although more remote, competitive threat to the American industry through application of the most favored nation clause.
