Contract For Bank Building Is Awarded

It will be interesting to Islanders to read the following clipping which was taken from "The Vancouver Evening Sun," of the 24th ult. Mr. Ernest E. Poole, who is the President and principal stock holder of "The Poole Construction Company" is a son of the late John T. Poole of Cardigan in this Province, and a brother of Mrs. E. S. Weeks, of Bayfield, N. B. This Company has recently opened an office in Vancouver and this is the first contract for them there.

The Company have several other contracts on hand. Mr. G. Roy Long is a son of the Doctor Long who formerly resided at Tyne Valley, P. E. He is a prominent lawyer in Vancouver and a graduate of Mt. Allison University.

It is announced today that the contract for the big addition to the Bank of Montreal at Granville and Pender streets, has been let to the Poole Construction Company Limited of Vancouver.

The building will cost \$400,000, and will, it is said, make this bank building one of the largest in Canada. It will have a frontage on Granville street of 120 feet and a depth on Pender of 104 feet.

The new structure will be made to conform in architecture to the present building.

Three storeys in height, with exterior walls of Haddington Island stone and large Corinthian columns at the front entrance supporting a massive cornice, surmounted by the coat of arms of the Bank of Montreal in carved stone, the building will present a beautiful and impressive appearance.

The entire ground floor will be used for a banking room, and will be lighted by large plate glass windows on three sides. The floor columns and wallscotting will be of marble, the walls of Caen stone, and the ceiling in ornamental plaster work.

From the public space a marble stair will lead down to the safety deposit department, which will be finished in similar manner to the banking room. This department will be fitted with heavy bronze grille entrance, large steel-lined vault and a number of large private coupon booths.

The second floor will be occupied by the district superintendent and his staff, and the third floor will be well-lighted rentable office space.

The architect for the bank is Kenneth Gustafson, F.R.I.B.A., of Montreal, who has prepared the plans for the building. The work of construction will be supervised by D. Colville, who represents the firm.

The Poole Construction Co. Ltd., the contractors, although recently incorporated in the Pacific province enjoy, through their personnel and the organization of their company a good reputation, having erected many substantial structures in the prairie provinces within the past two decades. The officers of the company here are: E. E. Poole, President; G. Roy Long, Vice-president; and E. E. A. Markham, A.M.E.I.C., managing director.
