REVEREND WM. RYAN.

AYLESFORD, Jan. 22.—Rev. William Ryan, retired Methodist minister, of Auburn, celebrated the ninety-third anniversary of his birth yesterday, and in spite of his great age is still in good health and able to get about day after day. Although the weather yesterday was very unpleasant, some of Mr. Ryan's friends paid him a visit to congratulate him, and other friends in various parts of the world sent their congratulations by mail.

Mr. Ryan was born in Moncton, N.B., January 23, 1833, and has been a Methodist minister almost seventy years. During that time he has spent seven years in the United States, five years in Prince Edward Island, eight years in Bermuda, and has also had a long term of service in Nova Scotia. He is still greatly interested in what is taking place, not only in his own community but throughout the world, and his mental fac-

ulties are still very active, although his sight and hearing are failing.

For many years Mr. and Mrs. Ryan have resided at their comfortable home at Auburn, and summer after summer Mr. Ryan may be seen in his garden busily engaged in raising vegetables and flowers in which he takes a great interest, and his garden is always Long Creek.

The death occurred at Ottawa, Ontario, on Wednesday, January 6th, after a short illness of Jemima McEwen, widow of the late Duncan McNeill was a daughter of the late John Clark McEwen of Long Creek.

The funeral was held from her home in the Bancroft Apartments at two-thirty on Friday January 8th, the service being conducted by the Reverend Ernest E. Sayles, Pastor of the first Baptist Church, Ottawa. Interment was made in the family plot in Beechwood Cemetery.

Surviving Mrs. McNeill are two sons, Fred of Ottawa, and Leslie of Toronto, and one daughter Grace, at home; also a sister, Miss E. A. McEwen; and four grandchildren, Howard McNeill, Ottawa, and Lois, Gordon and Stuart McNeill, Toronto.

Mrs. McNeill was predeceased by her husband in 1916.
