should be considered very carefully by the farmer, and every possible conservation be made of protein supplies so that available supplies might be distributed over the season's requirements.

General Discussion
Mr. S.D. Irvine of the Live Stock Branch outlined the services that were rendered by his department and felt that Government estimates submitted by the former speaker could be achieved if favourable circumstances presented themselves.

Mr. H.W. Clay of the Federal Live Stock Branch agreed with the former speakers, and felt that every effort should be made to stop leaks in the present season.

Mr. George Barbour of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board then addressed the meeting and spoke in connection with some of the regulations which are now in effect through the Board in which he is an expert.

Dr. E.S. Notting also outlined some of the provisions of the Health of Animals Act regarding the animal production in the Province.

Poultry Quotas
In the item of poultry quotas, Mr. A.F. Darnell, who is shortly to leave the Province, stated that we may look for an increase of 40 percent in day old chicks this year.

The facilities are being expanded he stated, and as far as he could see the increased production of poultry in the industry would be healthy, vigorous condition. He suggested that there is a considerable wastage of butter milk in creamery plants and that the loss in fish waste along the shores of the Province, some action, he thought, might be taken to save these available materials for poultry feed.

Canada's Official Food Rules

- MILK-Adults, 1-2 pint. Children, more than one pint. Cheese as available.
FRUITS-One serving of tomatoes, or of a citrus fruit, or their juices. One serving of other fruits, fresh canned or dried.
VEGETABLES-Two servings daily of vegetables, preferably leafy green, or yellow, and frequently raw, and potatoes once daily.
CEREALS and BREAD-One serving of a whole-grain cereal and 4 to 6 slices of Canada-Approved Bread, brown or white.
MEAT, FISH, etc.-One serving a day of meat, fish, or meat substitute. Liver, heart or kidney once a week.
EGGS-At least 3 to 4 weekly.
"Eat these foods first, then add these and other foods you wish"
Some source of Vitamin D such as fish liver oils, is essential for children, and may be advisable for adults.
