It is expected, if the day proves fine, that people will see the biggest and best days racing, and best side attractions that New Annan has ever staged. There are many side attractions that are not down on the program. Time and space won't permit.

Silver Belle Made New Track Record At Amherst Meet

AMHERST, Aug. 17.—Silver Belle, the little grey Brooklyn mare set a track record of 2:16 1/4 on Saturday afternoon, but failed to capture the 2:18 Trot and Pace although the judges changed the drivers after the mare had dropped back in the third and fourth heats. The change failed to bring a win, although Tom Etter, who was up in the last heat changed her shoes, and a portion of her harness, Harry G. owned by James Hennessy, of River Herbert, captured first money.

In the 2:24 Trot and Pace, Peter Stratton, owned by Walter Bragg, of Collingwood took a new mark of 2:18 1/4, in winning the class in three straight heats, while Marie Forbes, entered by Captain Merriam, Parrsboro, won the mixed race in four heats, Phil Bellevue driving Doris Kip, to a win the initial heat. Acrobot, the veteran race horse owned by Dr. Johnson, of Great Village, dropped dead in the second heat of the 2:24 class, after finishing in fourth position and forcing the pace from the start into the stretch.

The race horses in this class ought naturally to furnish one of the best races of the year 1925. There's Dan Patchon, 2:15 1/4; Pansy Aubrey, 2:18 1/4; Prince Wilkes owned by C. B. Merriam, Parrsboro, N. S., Hal Gentry, 2:14 1/4; Hector 2:19 1/4; owned by D. A. McPhoe, Howlan, and last but not least Longset, 2:06 1/2; the speedy son of the great speed sire Dillon Axworthy. It will be hard to pick a winner. This race alone ought to be worth the price of admission. The track record 2:16 1/4, (Peter Farn, 1919) will likely be broken. The most astute racing connoisseurs will be in a quandary. Prince Wilkes is an unknown quantity here and Capt. Merriam of Parrsboro, N. S., is entitled to the greatest credit for having the sportsmanship to enter all his horses against Prince Edward Island's best.
