WELL KNOWN HERE - The many friends of Dr. Harold G. Black, brother of Mr. Charles Black, Charlottetown, will be interested to learn that he has been included in the latest supplement to 'Who's Who in America'. Dr. Black, who has been English instructor at Hollywood High School since 1920, is listed as the author of four religious and educational volumes and editor of three other works. He has served as associate editor of the First Methodist Church of Los Angeles, is a member of the Authors Guild of America and an honorary life member of the International Mark Twain Society. Following are excerpts from letters from different Mission Centres showing their connection with the Week of Prayer. From Miss Florence Jack, The Canadian Mission Press, OHENGTU, WEST CHINA:

'We are most grateful for the generous gift made to further the cause of Literature work amongst Women and Children through this Press now made to us by the women's Inter Church Council. Thank you all so much. This good news arrived from Shanghai—the information regarding it—reached me the day before yesterday and certainly added a glow to the day as I visualize that could be planned by the sum of nearly two million Chinese dollars—this is the magnificent amount realized by the present high rate of exchange. I do not know to a covetous until the money actually comes through that it will be, but not far short of that amount. My mind, as I considered with Mr. Kichen the present plan, sees first a purchase of paper—that is first priority for the prices are simply soaring until one asks 'How much higher can they go?' and without paper—no literature! Next there will be some special literature put out for certain specific needs.

You would receive, I hope, a letter I sent you some very few weeks ago, mentioned having not heard from you for some time; also the fact of knowing nothing of 1946 Day of Prayer Programme and hoping that where a friend and I was, previous to that letter, quite early in the year I had forwarded Annual Reports of the United Christian Publishers and also of the Press in question.

This summer I had a very pleasant and restful holiday at a hill resort comparatively quite near to Chengtu. We had a comfortable 'home-side' bus—no regular cattle (trucks—its only virtue it did take us there) then five miles carried up mountain side to an old, quiet temple where a friend and I camped out for three and half weeks. My cook and his wife looked after our physical needs and the lovely mountain views, cool air and quietness did all that one could desire to strengthen, calm and bless to one's mental and spiritual uplift. I do not remember ever being more happy in my life. I wished every tired friend might have shared it. And I hope many of my friends at home did also have enjoyable summers.

My husband and I, after having considerable difficulties in getting back to pre-war system; that is to be expected. And the so very restless state of China at present makes quite a difficult task than would otherwise be. But we are distinctly nearer to normal than six months ago. And as the missionary forces increase we feel that we are gradually improving too. This great 'hinterland' needs, and abundantly repays attention and cultivation in Christian Literature.

From Union Theological College, OHENGTU, SZECHWAN, CHINA: We have opened for the autumn term. We have forty-one students, seventeen of whom are women. It is work of us of university and is preparing students for church work in the ministry and in religious education. We are now in the tenth year of our history. We feel that it is very important to the work of the church in West China will largely depend upon the kind of work that is done here in the preparation of church workers.

From Missal de Dondi, ANGOLO WEST AFRICA: A short time ago it was my privilege to assist with the packing of 10,000 books of 'Devotional Reading' which had been reprinted in Canada by photographic plates. It was through the generous gift of your Committee a few years ago that we were able to have the first edition of this book printed. The reprint could not be made here owing to paper shortage, and as there is no one to substitute for our printer when he went on furlough. Our stock of books last year was at a pitiful low level, C.M.P. and R.C.A.F. Much of the credit for our daily weather forecast is due to signal stations operated by the army in the far north. ROYAL REMEMBRANCE IS COINAGE TESTER

OTTAWA, Jan. 24 — (CP) — Canada's Royal Remembrance for the benefit of those who have not been aware of it, is Judge A. Gordon McDougall of Ottawa, senior justice of Carleton County. His office is that of chief test-tester of the coinage. On the first of Tuesday of each May, Judge McDougall visits the Royal Mint on Sussex street and swears in a board of experts who 'examine and report on' the quality of Canada's coin.

The task dates back to early English history when the precious metal content of coins was a measure of their value. Being a judge in a county which contains the national capital, Judge McDougall's work is often of a Federal rather than local nature. For example, he has tried several persons charged by the royal commission on espionage with transmitting secret information to Russia. In addition he presides at the biennial county sessions of the peace, the regular criminal court, rental appeals and applications under the Farm Loans Adjustment Act.

SOUTH AFRICA FIGHTS NEW CATTLE DISEASE

PRETORIA, South Africa, Jan. 24 — (CP) — The mysterious lumpy skin disease has taken its place with rinderpest and nagana as one of the major 'black plagues' that have ravaged the Union's cattle herds.

Cattle farmers say the epidemic is out of hand; that quarantine measures have failed to prevent the disease from spreading to every province of the Union; that many breeders of pedigree cattle and some big dairymen are facing bankruptcy; that the staff of the veterinary division hardly has time to get around to farms to put up quarantine cases; and that half the cases of lumpy skin which occur are not notified.

While breeders are clamoring for help, veterinary research laboratories have begun an experiment which may determine whether the disease is transmitted by an insect.

This is the first important step in the campaign against lumpy skin disease. Many experiments have been conducted with little result. The first essential is to establish how the disease is transmitted. It must be proved whether there is an insect carrier. The findings in this field all future research will be based on.

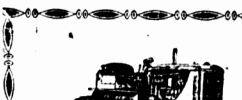
