Prince Edward Island Presbytery

The P. E. Island Presbytery of the United Church of Canada met in regular session in Hearts Memorial Hall on Tuesday, May 6th, at 11 a. m., and after devotional exercises was duly constituted by the Chairman, Rev. John Sterling, B. A.

On the approval of the minutes the court proceeded to the consideration of a lengthy docket of business. The Secretary gave notice of a meeting of lay representatives to be held at Conference on Thursday, June 5th, at 1:30 p. m., with a view to forming a Layman's Association.

The resignation of Rev. S. B. Proffit, B. A., from the O'Leary charge with application for leave of absence to continue studies was on motion received and transmitted to Settlement Committee of Conference. The Secretary presented three calls to the court, a call from the Margate charge to Rev. G. N. Somers, B. A. of Tryon; a call from Hampton charge to Rev. George Ayers of Margate; a call from O'Leary charge to Rev. A. F. Baker, of Arcadia, N. S. These were received and forwarded to the Settlement Committee.

At this stage the business was suspended and a deeply devotional service closed the morning session.

At the Afternoon Sederunt.

The Chairman reported for the committee to visit Belle River and Belfast that the congregation are unanimous in their desire to retain Rev. Mr. Macdonald as their minister recommending that Mr. Macdonald be given leave of absence until physically able to continue his work. On motion this recommendation was adopted and the arranging supply was placed in the hands of the Official Board with Rev. D. M. Sinclair of Valleyfield.

A communication from Mr. G. A. Leard of Souris, referring to the need of preserving the historical records of the Presbytery, was read and the following Historical Committee was on motion set up. Rev. J. M. McLeod, Rev. E. M. Aitken, Rev. Henry Pierce.

A ballot for commissioners to the General Council which meets in London, Ont., in September, was taken and those nominated are Rev. John Sterling, Rev. J. R. Saint, Mr. Horace Wright and Mr. W. E. Brooks. On motion Rev. E. M. Aitken and Rev. A. E. Chapman were nominated as members of the Settlement Committee. On the adoption of the report of the Nominating Committee the following appointments were made for the ensuing conference year.

Chairman of Presbytery Rev. A. E. Chapman; Secretary Rev. E. M. Aitken; Treasurer, Rev. J. M. McLeod.

Convenors of Committees: Missionary and Maintenance—Rev. Dr. Saint.

Home Missions—Rev. F. E. Boothroyd.

Foreign Missions—Rev. A. J. Reynolds.

Religious Education—Rev. W. E. Aitken.

Boundaries—Rev. T. A. Wilson.

Evangelism and Social Service—Rev. J. W. A. Nicholson.

Church Property—Rev. G. L. Somers.

Students—Rev. Dr. Ramsay.

Rev. Mr. Chapman reported for the Pension Fund Committee setting forth comparative values of the different Pension Funds of the Church. The withdrawal of Rev. H. Cooks resignation of Bideford Charge was received and forwarded to Settlement Committee. On motion the license of Mr. H. J. Bryan of Cascumpec as lay preacher was renewed for one year. The matter of the title of property of the Alberton Charge was presented to the Court by Rev. A. S. Weir and referred to the Property Committee of Presbytery.

It was a glad and solemn moment for Presbytery when two candidates for the ministry, Mr. Russell Woodside and Mr. Stirling Brown were licensed to preach the Gospel. The impressive service was conducted by the Chairman with dignity and feeling. Mr. Brown and Mr. Woodside were recommended for Ordination to the Ministry at Conference in Sackville in June. Mr. Garland Brooks appeared before Presbytery and was received as a candidate for the ministry. The right hand of fellowship was extended to Messrs. Brown, Woodside and Brooks and Presbytery rejoices in their giving themselves to the Ministry of the Church.

Bishop of Yukon Reviews Progress

TORONTO, Ont., May 22 1930 (By The Canadian Press) — Highly interesting news of his far-flung diocese was given by Bishop Stringer, veteran prelate of the Yukon, in an interview here recently. Rev. Dr. Stringer, with his wife, is spending a few weeks in Toronto before continuing to London, England, to attend the Lambeth Conference in July.

The bishop and his wife travelled by air from Dawson to White House enroute to Skagway, where they boarded the steamer for Vancouver. Bishop Stringer has spent 28 years in the north but his spirit of adventure is not in the least dimmed. An interesting sidelight of air travel in the Far North was mentioned by Bishop Stringer. During the time the missionaries were winging their flight from Dawson, a wireless message was received at Mayo from two fur trappers asking for plane service from Aklavik to Mayo. Already they had travelled 700 miles by dog sled with a good catch of valuable white fox, and they were anxious to reach civilization.
