THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY.

Friday April 23.

House met at 11.30. Mr. Arsenault asked the Commissioner of Public Works to explain how the items \$11.82 and \$4.50 come to be paid to R. A. MacDougall and why. Also if Wellington Road Bridge and the Clement's Bridge were sold by public competition, or done by day's work.

The Commissioner replied that the items were paid for an inspector to some bridges at the rate of 5%. In reply to the latter question he stated that the urgency of the matter required day's work.

Mr. Arsenault asked the Commissioner of Public Works to bring down the table of this House a detailed statement of how the items \$1200, Bashing Ice, District No. 5 and 6 Prince County; also \$61 75, Bashing Ice District No 10 Prince County are made up.

The Commissioner submitted the statement asked for.

Mr. Arsenault asked the Commissioner of Public Works if it is the intention of the Government during the coming summer to finish the road commonly called the Thaidy Road, also the extension of the St. Gilbert Road, commonly called the Sugar Camp Road, all on Lot 14; also to open a new road from Higgins Road to the shore in Lot 15, for which \$150.00 was paid during the last year for right-of-way.

The Commissioner replied that these roads were receiving the very serious consideration of the Government.

Mr. Matheson asked the Leader of the Government: 1st—If any contract or contracts has or have been made or entered into between the Government or any person or persons for supplying the Provincial Poor House with bread for the present year—1904. 2nd—Was such contract let by tender? If so, what notice was given of such tenders being received? How many tenders were received? From whom? and for what quantities, quality and price? 3rd—If no such contract for the said year has been made who are the persons supplying bread to the said Poor House since the first day of January, A. D. 1904 and upon what terms as to price and quality? 4th—Also, similar questions for the year 1903.

Hon. Mr. Peers replied to a question asked by the leader of the Opposition of the Commissioner of Public Works, submitting the returns requested stating that the tender of L. C. Worthy was accepted in both years.

A Bill to incorporate the Rogers' Hardware Company was referred to a committee of the whole on motion of Hon. Mr. Rogers with Mr. McWilliams in the chair and reported agreed to. The Bill provided that the capital stock of said Company hereby incorporated shall be \$200,000. Such capital stock shall be divided into two thousand shares of one hundred dollars each. When \$100,000 of such capital stock has been subscribed and fully paid up either in money or by the transfer to the Company of any lands, merchandise or any real or personal property, the Company may begin operations and do business under its Corporate name.

The debate on the Budget was then resumed.

VLADIVOSTOCK FLEET OUT AGAIN

Sinks Jap. Merchant Steamer and Enters Korean Harbor—News Boat Released—Phlug Denies that Japs Crossed Yalu—And Says all is Hopeful at Port Arthur Now.

VLADIVOSTOCK SQUADRON.

TOKYO, April 25.—(Special)—The Russian Vladivostock squadron after a long period of inactivity appeared off Gensan on the east coast of Korea and sank the Gyo Maru, a Japanese merchant steamer of six hundred tons.

ENTERED KOREAN HARBOR.

Three Russian cruisers entered the harbor. This makes it apparent that Vladivostock is not now blockaded by the Japanese.

NEWS STEAMER DETAINED.

PORT ARTHUR, April 25.—(Special)—The Chicago News despatch boat flying the British flag which was boarded and detained by Russian

officers off Port Arthur on Friday has been liberated on condition that she will not again approach the coast.

PHLUG DENIES REPORTS.

LONDON, April 25.—(Special)—Major General Phlug, formally denies the report that the Japanese have crossed Yalu River.

MORE RUSSIAN BOASTS.

The Russians now declare that all the land and sea weak points about Port Arthur have been made good and all places are impregnable and provision for a year's siege and the people said to be in good spirits.

THE HOTEL QUESTION AGAIN.

The City Council Chamber was filled to the doors yesterday afternoon to discuss the latest phase of the hotel situation. James Paton was chosen as chairman of the meeting.

F. L. Hazard spoke of the deplorable state of affairs in the city. He thought the proposition for the city to take stock as a last resort, was a most reasonable one. If the hotel is not opened the city will go back more in one year than we can regain in ten.

Donald Currie asked if the Bill to be submitted to the Legislature was not now in course of preparation.

Mr. Hazard replied that absolutely nothing had yet been done.

W. F. Tidmarsh was personally opposed to the city taking stock in the hotel. If the wealthy men will not take stock the poor men should not be forced to pay for it. He thought there was plenty of money in the city to purchase the hotel. It was not a sound business proposition and therefore people did not want to put their money into it.

R. E. Norton also opposed the purchase of the hotel by the city. If the capitalists are not men enough to put their money into the enterprise let it go. It would be a disgraceful piece of business to saddle the city with \$10,000, or \$20,000 debentures.

Walter Matheson thought private people could run the hotel more successfully than the city. He did not think the issuing of bonds would be advisable.

P. S. Brown thought the Steam Navigation Co. should buy the hotel. Many men would be found to take the hotel if the restrictions were taken off.

B. C. Prowse would like to hear the propositions that were to be submitted.

P. S. Brown moved that the meeting adjourn. The motion was seconded.

F. L. Hazard repudiated the idea that the city taking stock would be a tax on the poor man. He contended that the investment would be a good one for debentures could be issued at 5% and 7% or 8% realized on the money.

W. A. Weeks said he had asked for a meeting because he thought that the taking of stock by the city was a last resort. The city had as much right to assist the hotel as to build a market. The condition of Charlottetown at present was a disgrace to citizens. It would be well to consider the question seriously before it was dismissed.

P. S. Brown said this scheme had been hatched in a certain city drugstore.

Donald Currie suggested that a large meeting be held at which the working-men could give an opinion. Why could not Mr. Hazard convince the merchants that the hotel was a paying scheme. He suggested an adjournment till Wednesday or Thursday evening.

Mr. Currie moved in amendment, seconded by R. E. Norton that the meeting adjourn till Wednesday evening when the matter be further discussed.

J. P. Tanton condemned the City Corporation going into the hotel business.

Mr. Currie asked leave to withdraw the amendment. A. J. B. Melish made a motion that it was inexpedient to ask
