FLOWERS' FOUR PARTS

A flower is usually made up of four different kinds of parts, arranged in circles, or whorls, one within the other. Outmost are the sepals, which are green; they are usually firm and green; they protect the bud and steady the opened flower. Next come the petals making up the corolla; they are usually delicate and colored, often fragrant, and often making nectar; they thus attract insect visitors, and they are also useful in protecting the even more important parts further in. The third whorl consists of the rod-like stamens, whose heads or anthers make the golden yellow fertilizing dust or pollen. The innermost parts of the flower are the carpels, which bear microscopic egg cells, each of which, if fertilized, will develop into an embryo plant, or to put it in another way the carpels bear possible seeds when the fertilizing golden dust penetrates into them.

Death of Mr. Eli Mansel

The death occurred in Charlottetown, Friday, March 3rd, of Mr. Eli Mansel, at the advanced age of 93 years. The late Mr. Mansel came to Charlottetown in October last, accompanying his daughter, Mrs. Towrie, wife of Mr. R. B. Towrie, Manager of the Union Bank, with whom he had lived since he retired from business twenty years ago. He was born in Athens, Ont., July 5th, 1829, and was therefore in his 93rd year. He had lived a busy, methodical and happy life, which undoubtedly accounted for his extraordinary vitality and serenity in his declining years. He retained his mental faculties till the last moment of his life, and until a few days before the end came, he was able to be up and about, taking an active and intelligent interest in current events and in the history in which he took part. He was a most agreeable companion and took a keen delight in recalling events of the early days of the settlement here. Canada, His physical faculties, sight, hearing, speech, were quite folded away one by one to be taken up in renewed and eternal youth, a few hours later. Of him it may truly be said that he approached his grave as one who wraps the drapery of his couch about him and lies down to pleasant dreams.

His wife predeceased him by ten years. Mr. Mansel was a member of the Anglican Church and a Free Mason for sixty two years.

His remains will be taken to Athens to be interred beside his wife.

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Many Clashes in The Dail Eireann

DUBLIN, March 3.—Numerous clashes occurred again in the Dail Eireann today, the feeling running high. Mr. De Valera continued to press for recognition of the Dail's supremacy but the ministers of the provisional government held firmly that they were supreme and responsible only to the Irish people. Divisions continue to show there is no doubt that Griffith is in control. Observers expressed the opinion tonight that the net result of the two day's debate has been to strengthen the hands of the provisional government and increase public confidence in their ability to handle the situation.

In the course of a long debate on the election machinery Mr. Griffith maintained his determination to hold the elections as arranged three months hence and on the old register.

Displayed intense impatience.

The members of the provisional government displayed intense impatience at the tedious debates which they call an appalling waste of time. They have much work to do in connection with getting the free state established and are eager to get on with it. Mr. Collins, an adjournment bitterly reproached his opponents for failing to submit a single constructive idea. The finance minister's fears of undue expense amaze his associates; he works daily until two or three o'clock in the morning, getting only four or five hours sleep. The nature of the work of the provisional ministers, Mr. Collins informed The Associated Press, over a dependent was so complicated and delicate that it could not be delegated to subordinates.

Forenoon Session.

Dublin, Mar. 3.—Arrangements for the protection of Irish interests made between the provisional government and the Irish republicans were announced by Richard Mulcahy, minister of defense, at this forenoon's meeting of the Dail Eireann; the minister's statement supplying the principal feature of the season. He said the republican army would occupy and safeguard the military posts vacated by the British, the troops having agreed not to interfere with the coming election, with the Anglo-Irish treaty as the issue, and to abide by its results.

Bitterness was again displayed in the debate and party lines were closely drawn. At lunch time adjournment was taken until 4 p.m.

When the Dail assembled, ministers were called upon to answer more than thirty questions, the majority of which Arthur Griffith, president, declared were propounded "for the purpose of propaganda against the treaty."

"Shame," interjected Eamonn De Valera.

"For the opponents of the treaty to use the Dail as a means of harassing us will not be tolerated," retorted Griffith.

The cabinet of the Dail was working with the provisional government. He reiterated.

Regarding the Belfast boycott, he said the Dail cabinet had imposed it and the cabinet had revoked it.
