Co-operative Picture Is Producers Plan

HALIFAX, Aug. 14.—St. John, N. B., laid aside its "civil war" on the power question to enthusiastically co-operate on the making of a feature motion picture which will be advantageous to the province long after local discord is forgotten.

On the executive are:—Hon. Wm. Pugsley, Lieutenant Governor; Hon. Walter E. Foster, Premier; Robert Thomas Hays, M. P. P.; ex-mayor E. A. Schofield; J. M. Woodman, representative of the C. P. R. here; P. G. Spencer, owner of circuit of theatres; Rev. H. A. Coffy, author; M. E. Agge; J. M. Robinson, William S. Allison, James MacMurray and others, making fifteen in all.

Forty-five thousand dollars was subscribed at the first sitting of the directorate, and the financial firm of J. M. Robinson and Sons and the Eastern Securities are underwriting the balance up to seventy thousand, which will go to the public.

It is informed that the premier and other leaders of this province and city have agreed to co-operate here for the production of a Nova Scotia feature film. As both provinces will thus be making one of Frederick William Wallace's stories at the same time it will be establishing a new criterion for any future author—and Wallace is a Canadian.

Prince Edward Island adds its beauty and strength to the picture output of Nova Scotia. Now Brunswick and Newfoundland, we will assure the world's picture market with four big features in November. If the reports of my representative, Mr. J. R. Smallwood, to me are not overblown, this can be accomplished in which event would appropriate a wire of invitation from authentic sources. John Dean Sinclair, at Ottawa, asking that they confer with Premier McKenzie King or Senator Girouard, president of Ottawa Film Productions, Ltd., and learn the satisfaction with which Ottawa is carrying on a second picture there.

If His Honor Murdoch MacKinnon were furnished with copies of splendid pictures visualizing the agricultural and other natural advantages of the Island for the use of the government, about in the land, it would be a good auxiliary to immigration. To such enquiries when he intended the answer to be satisfactory he was accustomed to write across the note the letters "O. K." and return it to the writer.
