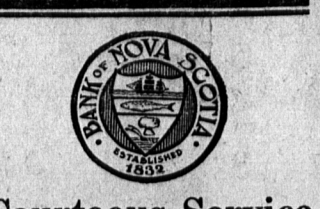

MR. THORNTON DEAD.—Mr. Thornton who for many years was a prominent officer on the New Brunswick Steamship line, plying between Boston, Halifax and Charlottetown, and at the time of his retirement was connected with the Plant Line died at his home 37 Emerson Road, Westport, Mass., Wednesday morning the 26th. Mr. Thornton has been in poor health for the past two years, the best medical skill in connection with good nursing failed to restore him to health. With his nurse and Mrs. Thornton he went South to escape the severe New England winter, but he got restless for home and they returned in a short time. He was preparing for an extended tour of the Province when he was stricken with pneumonia. Mr. Thornton survived by a widow who was Miss Jane MacMillan, daughter of John Ross MacMillan of Wood Islands. All his real and personal estate is bequeathed to her. Funeral was held Saturday afternoon with Masonic Services. Burial at Woodlawn.

HEAVY FINES.—A number of prohibition cases were tried on Saturday morning at the City Police Court before Mr. K. J. Martin. Pictou C. Brown was fined on each of three charges brought against him by Detective Samuel J. Elrod for offences committed in January. On the first charge he was fined \$200 or four months; on the second, \$100 or three months; and on the third, \$100 or two months. A charge against Wm. McDonald was dismissed for want of deponent's evidence. John Hughes was charged on a sixth offence, with breach of the Act. He was sentenced to six months' imprisonment without the option of a fine. Walter Mahar was fined \$20 or thirty days for having been drunk. He asked, for time to pay the fine. "No!" curtly answered Mr. Martin. "But I can pay it in a week's time, Your Honor, as I'm going to work," urged the defendant. "We don't want the fine. We want a sober man on the street" rejoined the Magistrate, and the defendant was escorted out of the Court.

DEATH OCCURRED.—The death occurred of heart failure at Webster's Corner, on April 14th, 1914, of Garrett Beard, aged 77 years. When a young man Mr. Beard moved to Murray Harbor Road to live with an aunt. After some years he removed to Wood Island Road and settled on a green wood farm on Lot 58. Twenty one years ago he moved to the Lane farm fronting on the Hillsboro River and there he resided until his death. Being a quiet, sober, industrious man he was soon esteemed as a valued neighbor which was testified to on the morning of his burial when seventeen of his old neighbors drove twenty miles from Iona to pay their last tribute of respect. The funeral to Fort Augustus Church on April 17th was largely attended, Rev. A. J. McDonald celebrating Requiem Mass. Besides a sorrowful widow, the following sons and daughter are left to mourn the loss of a devoted father—James in Summerville, Mass Mrs. Shea of Summerville, who came home for the funeral, and Joseph on the homestead. Fourteen grand children are also left to cherish his memory.

CONFEDERATION CELEBRATION.—A meeting of the Confederation Celebration Committee was held last night when it was decided to place an order for a memorial tablet of either bronze or brass, to be placed in the Legislative Chamber of the Provincial Building, the actual room in which the first conference on Confederation was held. A committee consisting of the Premier, Hon. J. A. Matheson, Mayor Sterns, Messrs. Paton, Pope and Major Bartlett, was appointed to arrange a program for the three days of the celebration. Mr. Harold Jenkins was appointed Chairman of a committee, to be nominated by himself, to look after the accommodation of visitors. Messrs W. H. Aitken and J. P. Gordon were appointed a committee on transportation and to secure the usual special railway rates. Mr. Blamhars was authorized to procure a fish exhibit.
