We have already remarked upon the departure from Liberal traditions by the Ross Government in deciding to refer the Gamey charges to a commission of Judges. There never was in Canada an abler or more conscientious teacher and expounder of Liberal principles than Hon. Edward Blake and when he was in Parliament in 1873 and the Pacific Scandal charges were under discussion Mr Blake took very strong ground against the reference of the investigation to a commission. land would not permit the fate of those prosecutions to depend on the care or skill of those who are versed in the ordinary forms of justice. No instance, has ever arisen in English history, where our ancestors have permitted a prosecution against the chief offender to be carried anywhere but in full Parliament." He went on to argue that it was subversive of the basic principles of justice for the accused party to name the tribunal by which he should be tried:

"In the first place it is contrary to the fundamental principles of justice that either the accusers or the accused should have the creation or control of the tribunal, which is to do any material thing in the trial. That commits itself to every man. Every one feels that it would be monstrous that he should himself be tried, or that anything important with reference to his trial should be done by a body of men all chosen by his accusers. Which of us, in any private contention, would agree that the other party should name the persons who were to take and report on the evidence? Would not each of us say: No, it is an unfair advantage: let us agree: let one of us name one party and let us or them agree upon a third. I cannot consent that either of us should have the exclusive nomination of the persons who are to perform such an important duty."

He further argued that the jury system was subverted and the right of challenge destroyed by allowing one of the parties to name the men who were to try the persons charged. It has been feebly put forward in extenuation of the action of the Ross Government that Gamey is upon his trial as much as Stratton is. If this were true, which it is not, then Gamey would have a double right to complain that he is to be tried by a tribunal selected by his

adversary. Mr. Blake's contention is so obviously sound that it will commend itself to the judgment of fair-minded persons everywhere.

It is the practice of all British Parliaments and Legislatures not to enter upon the regular business of the session until after the King's speech in the United Kingdom, or the Governor's speech in a Provincial Legislature—has been duly acknowledged by an address in reply thereto. The long debates which sometimes take place on the address thus delay the work of legislation. Such long debates were too common in years past, but in recent years have been usually shortened, except in those rare cases where some member of the Opposition moves an amendment. The amendment in such case is usually treated as a want of confidence motion and voted down. Our own Legislature having passed the address is now ready for business, which it is to be hoped will be diligently attended to.
