MANNERS AND MOTORING

A holiday is an ideal time to observe motoring manners—or lack of them. As his car was in the repair shop I asked Smith to go riding with me. "I thought he was going to turn left," Smith said. "He should have kept to the right side of the street and motioned us to go on past him."

"He thinks only of himself," I replied. "That is one reason why there are so many accidents." "But the words were hardly off my lips when another car coming out from my front stopped dangerously near my front fender. A highly excited driver with a car full of children was shouting, "What's the matter with you?" "I had the right of way!"

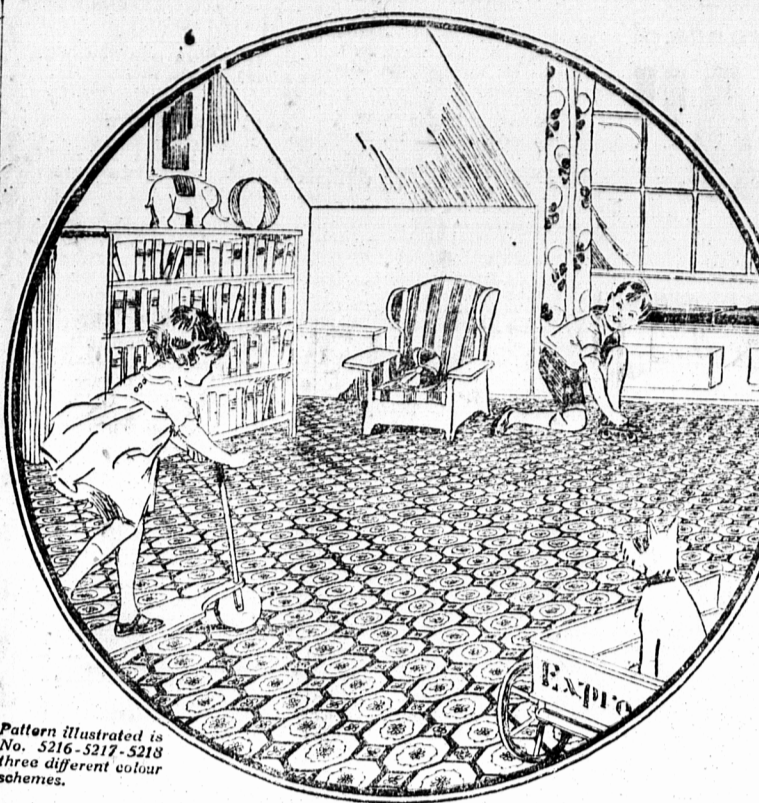
"You had better try to cultivate some common sense!" Smith shouted back. "I decided upon a different plan, instructing the driver to pull over to the curb. When Smith and I stepped over to his car the motorist was mopping beads of perspiration from his forehead, anticipating the usual thing that happens when motorists have a disagreement."

"Now we can talk the matter over," I began. "Drivers who sit in their cars and shout at each other aren't gentlemen—and they block traffic." "What's that to do with you trying to pass me when I had the right of way," the other raged. "It has to do with your learning to be a gentleman driver," I retorted. "The law provides that the car approaching from the right shall have the right of way provided both cars are approaching at approximately the same speed. When you stopped your car, you were in low gear. Undoubtedly I was going faster than you and, therefore, had the right of way. But I didn't outpace you because I had that right. The driver of the car ahead could just as well have parked a few feet further on. "Majority of these motorists think they joined the motoring club when they got their license," I said to Smith when we had started again. "But they are not eligible until they realize that there is such a thing as sportsmanship in motoring. Take that fellow who is test-driving his horn behind us now. He wants me to get off the street so he can pass. One touch of the horn button would have been enough. On the open road he'd run right into you without ever honning once."

Chicago's Rum Row Death Toll Near End

CHICAGO, Sept. 29.—The death toll of Chicago's Rum Row, which has reached 75 in the last two years of gang warfare, is almost complete, in the opinion of the principal police officers, and alcohol dealers are about "shot to pieces."

The leaders and many of the followers of these gangs have been the object of elaborate funerals, or are in the hands of police and federal authorities. The coroner's statistics show that many more have been eliminated by bullets than by law, but eventually most of those still alive have been arrested, and another "wild west" epic, as lurid as any of the past, is closed.

A police legend now accepted as fact traces the beginning of the gang war to the death, November, 1924, of Mike Merlo, acknowledged leader of the west side Italians. He is said to have forbidden hostilities against rivals in the business of manufacturing and dispensing illicit liquor. While he was alive, occasional liquor robberies known as "hijacking," were the only outbreaks. Merlo died of pneumonia, not bullets.

The day after his funeral, Dion O'Bannon, head of a composite gang, chiefly with Irish surnames, was shot down and the war was on. Sometimes the police were able to encounter an auto load of gangsters and a few of them met death in conflict with the law. But mostly always competitors got to them first with little or no trace of the assassins.

Revenge in Death Of Merlo's lieutenants were the six Genna brothers, three of whom were chiefly slain in revenge for the O'Bannon shooting. Many of the other gangs were "taken for a ride," shot and thrown from an automobile along suburban roads. An assistant state's attorney, James McSwiggan, happened to get in the way of a gangster's machine gun, and was killed with two others. One of them, the man really sought, was a boyhood friend of McSwiggan.

Beginning Of "War"

The death toll grew until 54 names were added in the first eight months of 1925 and then the leaders of the Sallis-McErlane group about the last of the list, were taken on murder charges.

Interesting Ceremony Will Be Observed

QUEBEC, Sept. 29.—Formalities attending the arrival of Lord Willingdon, Canada's New Governor General, at Quebec, will include one ceremony which is always observed with traditional dignity. This will be the presentation to His Excellency the Great Seal of Canada, which he will return to the Secretary of State for Canada with the words, "I hand you the great seal of Canada for safekeeping."

The Great Seal of the Dominion of Canada signifies the Royal Assent on the most important of government papers. That has been the custom under the British flag since the time of Edward the Confessor, who caused the first great seal of England to be made. When the King and Queen who is reigning dies, the great seal of that reign is solemnly destroyed, to be replaced by one bearing the likeness of the new sovereign.

VOTED AT THE AGE OF 103 SYDNEY, N. S., Sept. 28.—John Pendergast, aged 103 years is believed to have been the oldest voter to cast a ballot in Cape Breton North and Victoria at the recent federal election. He is believed to be the only surviving soldier of the Militia Regiment, which presented arms to King Edward VII when that monarch, then Prince of Wales, landed at Centreville, C. B., in 1860.
