**IN MEMORIAM**

MR. JOHN M. HUGHES

The death occurred in this city early yesterday morning of Mr. John M. Hughes, who for the past thirty-seven years has been an employee of the Charlottetown Post Office, receiving his appointment on the 1st of July, 1891 and advancing step by step in the service until he obtained the position of Assistant Postmaster on the 1st of June, 1928.

He was faithful in the performance of his duties and was always looked upon as an efficient employee. Mr. Hughes was born at St. Mary's Road, Kings County, on the 20th December, 1865, and taught school for a few years before entering the Government service.

During his residence in Charlottetown he was always held in high esteem as a citizen.

He was a devoted member of the Roman Catholic Church and took a leading part in the Knights of Columbus Society.

To his bereaved widow and the members of his family an immediate relative, the Guardian extends sincerest sympathy.

GEORGE I. BIRT

A deeper and more sorrowful wave of sadness has probably never passed over a community than that of which we swept over the vicinity of Peake's, when the Angel of Death visited the P. E. Island Hospital on April 5th and took for their victim the soul of George I. Birt, at the age of 62 years, who was enjoying good health up to the time of his death when he was stricken with appendicitis. He was then at once taken to the P. E. I. Hospital, where an operation was performed which was found to be too late, but being hardy and strong would not sanction having a Doctor till it was really too late.

He was a highly respected farmer, a true friend to everybody and willing to lend a helping hand to anyone in the time of need. He was a member of United Church of Mt. Stewart, also a member and ex-officer of McLean L. O. L. No. 1843.

His many relatives and friends were clearly shown by the large number of carriages and pedestrians who paid their last respect to the deceased, when they followed his remains to Mt. Stewart Cemetery and gathered around the grave for the final services.

He leaves to mourn besides a widow, a broken wife, two daughters, and four sons viz. Mrs. J. W. Webster at Cardigan, P. E. I.; Marton at home; David at Mt. Stewart; Norman and Alfred at home and George of Boston, Mass., who arrived at his father's bed side on receipt of the news of the operation. Also five sisters and two brothers, viz. Mrs. W. H. Birt, Cove Head; Mrs. John Atleck, Mt. Stewart; Mrs. James Jay, Peakes; Mrs. James Campbell, Newbury Port, Mass., and Mrs. John McCannell, Boston, Mass. Jonathan, in Boston, and David at Peakes.

He also had two brothers who predeceased him, Edmund and Samuel. The funeral services were conducted at the house by the Rev. M. K. Stewart of United Church at Mt. Stewart. The hymns sung were "What a friend we have in Jesus," "Will there be any stars in my Crown?" also a solo was nicely rendered by Miss Edith Jay, namely "Let Jesus lead, He knows the way."

The regular service was conducted at the grave by the Rev. Mr. Charman, after which an impressive service was held by the Orangemen. We cannot say and will not say. That he is dead, he is just away. With a cheery smile, and a wave of the hand.


