DOMINION REVENUE.

August just past showed a diminished customs revenue as compared with the like month a year ago. Is it the turn of the tide? No one need be surprised should it so turn out. Three fourths of the total revenue of the Dominion is raised from customs duties. From the beginning it has been that way. But the amount of the customs duties has fluctuated greatly from year to year, always mounting higher in the longer periods.

In 1868 the total was about eight and a half millions. In 1875 it passed the fifteen million mark, dropped to twelve and a half millions in 1877, rose sharply to twenty three millions in 1883, under the higher tariff, receded below nineteen millions in 1885, again rose to nearly twenty-four millions in 1890 and fell to about seventeen and a half millions in 1895. Since that time under Liberal rule the customs revenue has more than doubled passing thirty seven millions in 1903, with a further considerable increase for the year ended with June last.

It seems pretty clear that we have for the time passed the summit of a booming revenue period and must now face a period of decline. How far the recession may go we can only guess. The sharpest decline in Canadian history gave a dip of six millions from 1891 to 1895. It is not likely to be worse than that at the worst. It may indeed be very slight owing to the vast public undertakings which will cause an enormous expenditure in the years next to come.

MR. CHAMBERLAIN'S PROPOSALS.

Mr. Chamberlain in his great speech at Walbeck Abbey, where he addressed 12,000 people also spoke to the agricultural classes of Great Britain through the press reports of what he said. The gist of his speech was a policy of retaliation against foreign manufacturers and of protection for agricultural producers. He would place a duty of six cents per bushel on foreign grown wheat and all other grains except Indian corn, and 5 per cent on meat, dairy products, preserved milk, poultry, eggs, vegetables and fruits. As to flour, he would so arrange the duties as to have all the milling done in the British Isles. This provision does not suit Canadian millers, and the notion of leaving corn on the free list, an article of exclusively United States growth—is in no way conducive to inter-imperial trade. Mr. Chamberlain pointed out that the duties on foodstuffs in France were many times greater than he proposed and had not raised the price or the cost of living there, which are less than in the British Isles. With the millions which the new duties would bring to the treasury "from the pockets of foreigners" he proposed to take off 4 1/2 pence per pound of the tea duty, half the present duty on sugar, and to reduce the duty on tobacco.
