Testing Time For the Dailies

TORONTO, Sept. 20.—At a conference of the advertising men of Western Ontario, some few days ago, Mr. John Imrie, Manager of the Canadian Daily Newspapers' Association, said that "the dominant factors which will contribute to the testing time for Canadian dailies are summed up in a quotation of the past, present and predicted prices of newspaper."

"Newspaper, which is today costing \$110 a ton, will jump to \$130 a ton about October 1st," he declared. "These prices, when contrasted with \$36 a ton for newsprint in 1916, an increase of 261 per cent., will be an important factor which will mean closing of some newspapers and the establishing of the others on a firmer basis. Some men who are in close touch with the newspaper situation predict that newsprint will soar to \$160 and \$175 a ton before next year. Coupled with this is the mounting cost of labor, which has already increased 100 per cent over the cost in 1916, and the increased cost of postal rates by 100 per cent. In the coming period, these are compelling factors which every newspaper must face at the present time, and unless wise planning and deep thinking are resorted to, both individually and collectively, by newspapers, there will be many dailies no under before the peak is past."

Ready for Races At Fredericton

FREDERICTON, N. B., Sept. 20.—The Fredericton Park Association's fall races will open here tomorrow with favorable weather conditions for the first time in the three weeks of September campaign of the Maritime and Maine circuits.

It was finally arranged this afternoon that the programme would be raced exactly as carded with the exception of the 2:30 trot which moved forward from the third to the second day, the 2:21 trot and pace being moved back to take its place.

The last lot of horses which is expected arrived tonight from Woodstock and includes the stables of H. A. Nevins, the Houlihan (Mc.), driver, Dr. D. H. McAllister, of Sussex, and the Woodstock Driving Club. Horsemen have been arriving here in large numbers today and automobile parties, who have come in from Aroostook county as well as various parts of New Brunswick.

It is expected tonight that John Willard the Presque Isle driver, who has been carrying on his action for \$10,000 damages against the Northern Maine Fair Association, will arrive here tomorrow morning from Aroostook county, but even if he should not get here arrangements are complete to have his horses driven in the races by Fred Cameron and Tommy Raymond, two of the most capable reinsmen on the circuit. The races tomorrow are the 2:12 trot and pace, the 2:25 trot and 2:27 pace, the latter having eight starters, the largest field on the opening day.

HARD COAL MINERS RETURNING TO WORK.

READING, Pa., September 21.—Reports from the Schuylkill hard coal region received here today indicated slightly more than 5 per cent of the men have resumed work. It is expected that 70 cars of anthracite will be produced during the day. In normal times the daily average production is 1,400 cars.

HAZELTON, Pa., September 21.—The end of "vacation" strikes in the anthracite coal region today depends upon the attitude of the mine operators, toward reinstating monthly men who quit in sympathy with the miners. This was indicated by reports received here by officials of the United Mine Workers which showed that "vacationists" were returning in all districts except in the Schuylkill fields, where the hard coal diggers have voted to remain out until the operators have re-employed the "sympathy" strikers. Chris J. Golden, President of District 9, estimated that more than 1,000 workers would remain away from work until all the monthly men were reinstated.


