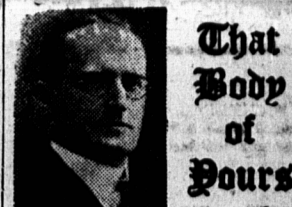

IMPORTANCE OF HEADACHE

Cranberry Growing And Canning

THIS ISLAND EXCELS ALL AS A PRODUCTIVE FIELD

Historical

We are loth to treat this subject in a half-hearted style as we have great faith in the future of the berry whether the "wild" grown or the cultivated on modern lines.

Nor does the matter of ownership offer any more obstacle to superiority than the ownership of the various products of the farm respecting live stock, etc. The question of all owners organizing unitedly is, however, a very important feature of the output.

In a letter which appears in the Report of the Department of Agriculture of this Province, for 1925, Mr. M. B. Davies, Chief Assistant, Division of Horticulture, Ottawa, furnishes a good deal of information and pays a noteworthy tribute to this Province which deserves the very widest publicity and thanks that can be given to it.

As to the prosecution of work leading towards the development of the canning industry, there is an excellent opportunity awaiting some Province of the Dominion to supply the home market demand as cranberries at present are not produced in any quantity in Canada.

Judging from the presence of the wild cranberries on the island, their general excellence and productivity there would seem to be sufficient warrant for extended experimental work. This work should take shape in two directions: (a) purely extension works with existing cranberry bogs, and the development of a bog, under Government control, for experimental purposes.

Death Recalls Old Association

HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 19.—A link with the Halifax of nearly a century ago passed away with the death in Montreal recently of Mrs. Robert McMurray in her 93rd year.

As a child she came to Halifax with her parents from England, and until about thirty years ago she resided in this city. Mrs. McMurray loved to tell of the Halifax of her girlhood and her memory was exceptionally clear.

"She loved to tell of the ponderous watchmen who patrolled the streets at night and would mimic their cry—"One o'clock and all's well."—Of the custom in those days of a town crier disseminating the news and when a valuable article or a child was lost the crier would stalk the following life streets, ringing his bell and crying "Lost, Lost."

When a suitable crowd was gathered he would stop and cry out the details.

Mrs. McMurray's home was on the present site of the Institution for the Deaf and Dumb on Gottingen street. In later years her father returned to England, but Mrs. McMurray had married at the age of 19, Robert McMurray, a leading drug goods merchant. On his death she went with her children to Montreal where she remained until her death. Two daughters add a son survive, and until her death the family was represented there by four generations.
