Great Loss By Forest Fires in B.C.
VANCOUVER, Aug. 6.—Millions of feet of merchantable lumber are being destroyed, settlements, homes and logging camps are threatened and thousands of acres of timber and bush lands are being burned over by the numerous forest fires prevailing all over the Province.

At Stillwater, flames have swept 300 acres, destroying nine million feet of standing and felled timber.

Driven by high winds, the fire at Pender Harbor and Sechell are reported to be out of control and although fought by hundreds of men, are sweeping toward green timber.

Many of the fifty fires reported to be burning in the Kamloops district are reported out of control and destroying timber.

As a result of these fires a heavy pall of smoke extends right through the interior of the coast and even some distance out to sea.

Closing Sessions
(Continued from Page 1)

In connection with the sale of Methyl Hydrate under the Inland Revenue Act in view of many serious accidents having taken place through its consumption as a beverage, the committee suggest that steps be taken to amend the act so that this substance should not be put up in bottles in which beverages are commonly sold. Further that no other label appear on the container where straight methylated spirits is being sold than the label required by the statute.

Regret expressed that the Council of this Association were not able to prevail upon the Government the expediency of having the Sales Tax removed so far as it affects the sale of medicines, the committee persist in its efforts to have this tax removed.

The committee suggest that the council take steps to have the Proprietary and Patent Medicine Act so amended that in cases where the formulae of any preparation has been made public before its registration under this Act, such preparation be not capable of registration and that in the event of any preparation being registered and subsequently thereto its formulae be made public, that such registration be cancelled.

While the opinion of the committee is necessarily drastic in its character because of the necessity of curtailing the illicit sale of narcotic drugs and thus removing a menace to the life and health of the public, occasions will arise when minor infringements are inadvertently made and where the penalty is altogether disproportionate to the offense committed, the committee would recommend.

(a) that the Council make representations to the Minister of Health whereby such cases be not prosecuted without his personal permission;

(b) While the amendment of this Act of 1925 removes codeine entirely from its provisions it should be noted that codeine must be sold subject to the provisions of the respective Pharmacy Acts of the various Provinces. The same applies to Apomorphine.

(c) In the matter of penalties for minor offenses it would appear that these are excessive and in some cases where a strict compliance with some provisions of the Act is not made by the druggist he may be charged as a criminal with no redress by way of appeal. The committee recommend that the Council carefully consider what amendments might be made to the Act to lessen what would appear to be too drastic provisions in this regard and that these be presented to the Minister of Health for his consideration.

With reference to Dominion registration which came up before the Council at its Calgary meeting last year a draft bill was presented which it was thought should be put in fuller form. This has been done and the committee suggest that this bill be now sent to the various provincial associations and colleges for their consideration and that the matter be reported upon again by the Council of this Association. Moved by G. E. Hughes, Charlottetown, Carried.

Mr. Murdoch for his address; to all firms who contributed funds or in any way assisted in making this convention a success; to the press and pharmaceutical journals for excellent publicity; to the president, chairman of Council and officers during the past year for their untiring efforts; to the Nova Scotia Pharmaceutical Society congratulations on the attainment of their 50th anniversary.

Legislation Committee Report

Education—After examining carefully the report of Prof. Stewart Dunn on Pharmaceutical Education the Council took up the definite establishment of a committee of Education composed of representatives of all the colleges in Canada together with the Chairman of this Association and four members engaged in retail pharmacy throughout Canada to debate the subject of uniform matriculation and standardization of the study of Pharmacy, also to make reports of their deliberations to the executive twice yearly. The committee as above constituted should give consideration to the revision of the British Pharmacopoeia possibly through the medium of a Canadian Codex.

Re the question of certified clerks a standard for Canada should be considered and a recommendation made by the committee at next convention.

The general provincial bodies should be asked to report on the advisability of the adoption of a code of ethics as submitted last year which should take definite form before the next meeting of the Association.

TORONTO, Aug. 6.—Rev. Dr. C. C. Pidgeon, Moderator, reported on his visit with colleagues to England at a meeting of the Executive of the General Assembly of the United Church of Canada.

Dr. Pidgeon stated that cordial relations between the United Church and the Mother Churches of the Old Country would be likely to result.

A reciprocity in ministerial supply was one of the results expected from the trip. Another important problem taken up was that of looking after immigrants from the British Isles on their arrival in Canada.

The committee will probably be meeting for at least two days, having many important matters to consider. It was desired to join the general missionary publications of the uniting churches into one publication, the Editor of which will be W. T. Gunn.

Creates Precedent

MOBILE, Ala., Aug. 6.—Establishing a precedent for the United States judiciary system, Judge Robert T. Ewin, in federal court has ruled that the prohibition laws of the United States extended beyond the three mile limit, when he upheld the conviction of the six members of the crew of the British schooner Francis E. by a federal jury on charges of violating the Tariff Act and prohibition act.

THE MARKETS

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 6.—(Eggs)—Receipts and fairly firm markets continue in the egg trade throughout Canada. Eastern receipts report some falling off in price as the result of the heat. New Brunswick and British Columbia egg markets remain well supplied. A slight drop is noted in quotations of fresh eggs today. Toronto market remains steady and unchanged. Jobbing specials 12, extras 40, firsts 37, seconds 33. Montreal reports that their persistent heat wave is still affecting the market. A change in weather would have considerable effect in making conditions firmer. Dealers are paying extras 35 1/2, firsts 3, seconds 28 1/2, Ontario points Manitoba and Saskatchewan markets remain unchanged with receipts light, quality only fair. Winnipeg jobbing extras 36, firsts 53, seconds 31. Vancouver extras 41 to 42, firsts 33 to 35, seconds 36. Live poultry market remains easy and unchanged. St. John the market is well supplied with eggs, price firm, good demand. Wholesale extras 42, firsts 49, seconds 35 retail extras 50, firsts 45, seconds 40.

MONTRÉAL, Aug. 6.—There was an increased demand from foreign buyers for Canadian grain here today and as prices were in line with local exporters views considerable business was transacted. Spot prices of oats were moderate sized. The feature of the flour situation was the increased enquiry from foreign sources and several large sales were made. The local trade was quiet but firm. Spring wheat flour continued to sell in good form. Both home and foreign business contributing to the continued run of fair trade. The tendency was steady. Owning to the good demand from outside sources trading in all lines of milled wheat active and prices were firm. The trade in standard grades of rolled oats was normal and steady. Prices for butter and cheese were well maintained but the demand was small. Excessive dullness marked the trade in eggs.

CLAIMS MADE FOR INSULIN
IN NON-DIABETIC PATIENTS
VANCOUVER, Aug. 6.—The decision of the American Medical Association investigators reported, and others corroborated, that the administration of insulin to non-diabetic persons resulted in a very intense and healthy status of the body, to raise ten thousand dollars along the border to carry on the "sandy trial" opened in Chicago yesterday.
