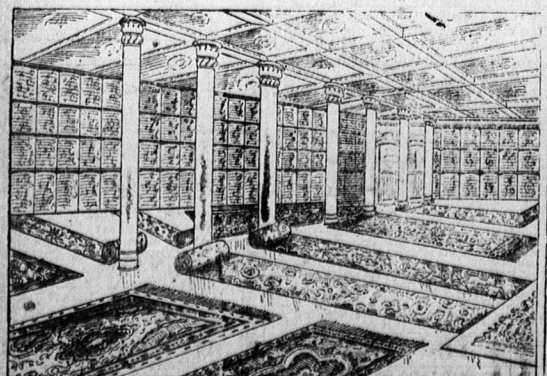

**THE MONCTON-QUEBEC SECTION.**  
The proposal to duplicate the Intercolonial by a new line from Quebec to Moncton was the one part of the Grand Trunk Pacific scheme which aroused most opposition in Parliament and in the press. It was the strong feature of Hon. A. G. Blair's opposition. It has long been known that the Grand Trunk people have no desire to have this portion of the line constructed or to operate it when built. Now we have this interesting statement from the Montreal Witness, which is friendly to the Laurier Government:

"Survey work on the Quebec-Moncton section of the National Transcontinental Railway has been suspended (until spring). There is a feeling in railway circles that this portion of the work will be abandoned, on the ground that it ought never to have been taken on to the enterprise. So long as the Intercolonial is unable to yield any return on the capital invested—and at present it is a long way from even paying operating expenses—there will be, it is said, no necessity for building a competitive line between Moncton and Quebec, at a cost estimated at \$17,500,000."

It is between Moncton and Quebec that the Intercolonial has been rolling up its deficits. The line between St. John and Halifax is known to pay well. Now, to build a second Government line—for the Government is to build and own it—between Quebec and Moncton is to build a second line practically alongside that portion of the Intercolonial which is sinking from half a million to a million or more yearly. From Quebec city to the New Brunswick border the two lines cannot be more than a few miles apart. Through central New Brunswick they may be more widely separated for some distance.

But the difficulties of the central route through New Brunswick are very great in the matter of grades and the route will traverse an unsettled tract of land, with little chance for local traffic. On the other hand to descend the St. John River valley will be to lengthen the line to nearly the mileage of the Intercolonial and at the same time run for 150 miles close alongside the C. P. P. These are among the reasons why no location has yet been made, and why many persons believe the line from Quebec to Moncton will not be built. At the same time several Ministers, including Mr. Emmerson, have from time to time affirmed that this portion of the road will yet be built.

Last winter was the winter of our discontent with regard to the winter service. This winter the steamers are plying with clock-work regularity and the mail special connecting with the boats shows commendable harmony between the Post Office and Marine Department, such as did not formerly exist. But the route is a very circuitous one. A Summerside man who wants to go to Moncton in summer has a journey of 60 miles. By the winter route he is forced to make a circuit of 287 miles. A like addition of 227 miles applies to the winter journey to all New Brunswick, United States and Western Canadian points.

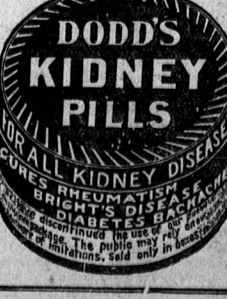
