The presence of a warship in our harbor for three days has revived the interest in Britain's navy. Those who have met with the blue-jackets of the British navy are possibly not aware that they are anxiously awaiting the decision of the admiralty on the report of the special committees appointed last year to investigate the whole subject of the naval dietary and report upon what alterations and additions, if any ought to be made. It appears that there has been no change of importance in the time or quality of the meals during the last half-century. The belief is that the committee have recommended additional meals and a greater variety of food, but that there is some difficulty with the treasury department, which points out that an extra cost of one half-penny a day per man means £100,000 a year.

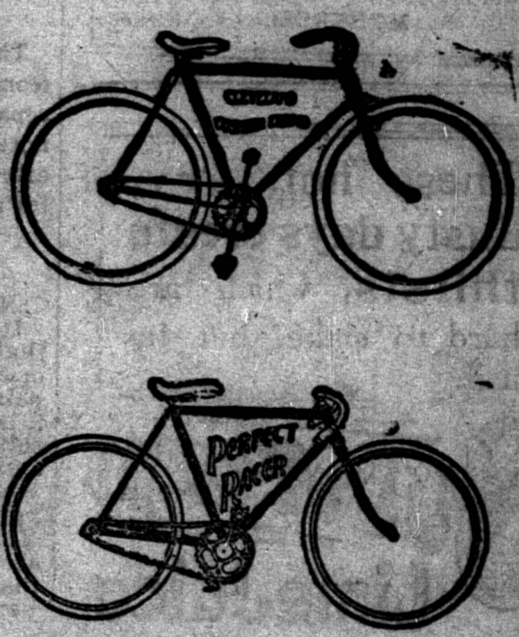
