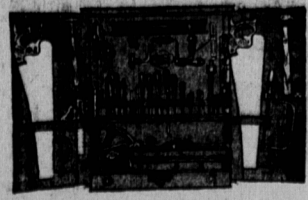
THOMAS N. WEEKS

Thomas N. Weeks, 42, a member of the South Portland City Government for four years, died Friday morning, May 3rd, at a local hospital where he has been receiving treatment for several weeks. Canadian West

With the exception of a few localities in Saskatchewan and Southern Alberta, the West benefited from rain during the past week and crop conditions are brighter than they have been at this period for some years, according to the fifth weekly crop report of the Canadian National Railways. In Northern Alberta and over the whole of Manitoba, the first fall was heavy, thoroughly meeting urgent requirements and building up a valuable reserve of moisture. Saskatchewan generally did not fare as well, though most points were visited by showers, which relieved the anxiety which was being felt. Areas around Saskatoon, Roseton and Conquest in Saskatchewan and the southern part of Alberta could do with more rain, though there is no present danger from lack of moisture. Warm, bright weather succeeded the rain, furnishing ideal growing conditions generally, and the general outlook at the moment is highly satisfactory, and a tone of optimism is present in all reports throughout the West. In the area from Muir to McCredy and in the Oakburn district, all in Manitoba, cut worms are reported but they have done no damage as yet. Cut worms have also been found at Star City, Sask., and grub worms under the soil near Valparaiso, but these points also report no damage. The few points that reported ideal also added no damage had been caused. Seeding is now completed and wheat is as high as seven inches above ground. Fall rye is doing well, and pasture land is in splendid condition. Some samples of Fall rye as high as eighteen inches have been secured in Manitoba and Saskatchewan.
