By-election Called For Fifth Prince

A Provincial by-election for the Fifth District of Prince has been called for Nov. 28th, it was announced yesterday. Nomination day will be Nov. 12th.

The by-election was made necessary by the recent death of Mr. Daniel F. MacNeil, Progressive Conservative assemblyman of Summerside. Named to contest the seat by the Liberals at a convention last week was Mr. Carrol Delaney of Summerside.

This is the second by-election in the Fifth District within a year, the previous one having been called due to the resignation of Lt. Col. Strong in order to contest the Federal election last year. In last year's by-election, Mr. Morley M. Bell, K.C., of Summerside, was elected by acclamation.

Mr. James McCordie, Kinkora, has been appointed returning officer for the coming election.

Says Wales Program Is "Insufficient"

LONDON, Oct. 28.—(CP Cable)—D. R. Grenfell, Labor member for Gower and leader of the Welsh Parliamentary Group in the House of Commons, rose today after Sir Stafford Cripps outlined government plans for Wales and said the program was "insufficient."

The blond, former Nova Scotia coal miner said government proposals for employment in industry in Wales did not meet the wishes of Welsh members of Parliament, labor men and others.

Sir Stafford, president of the board of trade, had outlined a program for the restoration and development of industry in Wales and added that the appointment of a minister for Wales—requested by Welsh members—would lead to nothing but delay and inefficiency. He said that in an area the size of

LONDON, Oct. 28.—(CP)—Crawshaw passenger shippling around the British Isles interrupted by the war, has not yet been restored, and the prospect is that it will never again reach a high level.

The Leith, London service of London and Edinburgh Shipping Company is being run with cargo ships following war-time loss of the Royal Anchor, Royal Pegasus and Royal Scot. When replacements are built they will probably carry only 12 passengers each.

Dundee, Perth and London Shipping Company has lost its two biggest passenger vessels. The Perth became a North Atlantic rescue ship and is not expected to return to her old trade. The London was a guard ship, a Gummy destroyer and finally a obsolescence. She probably will not be restored.

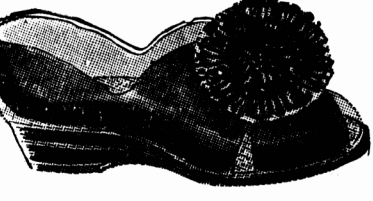

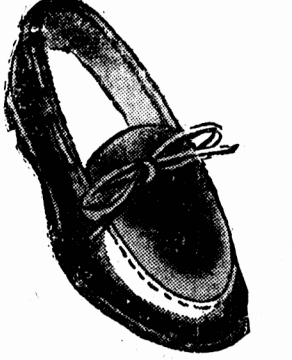

German Doctors Accused Of Murdering Thousands In Brutal Experiments

JOHANNESBURG, Oct. 17.—(CP)—The first body ever to be received by the W. Watersrand University, Johannesburg, as a result of the provisions of a law that has just been handed over to the medical faculty. It is also believed to be the first time in South Africa that this has happened.

The body is that of Lionel Rees, well-known amateur actor and member of the Johannesburg Repertory Players who was killed when he fell from the fifth floor of a city building.

The handing over of the body marks the practical application of a law passed in March 1946, making it possible for, and even obligatory upon, an anatomy school to accept a body donated to it in a will.

NUERNBERG, Germany, Oct. 25 (AP)—Indictments charging murder of "hundreds of thousands of human beings" by euthanasia and brutal medical experiments were filed today against 23 German doctors held for action by special American military courts.

The medical experiments were performed upon prisoners in Nazi concentration camps. The euthanasia program was aimed at eliminating "useless eaters"—the crippled, the incurably ill and insane—among the German people.

The doctors will be brought to trial next month in the first of a series of war crimes prosecutions which Brig-Gen. Telford Taylor said would result in the arraignment of between 250 and 500 former Nazi military, industrial, financial and government leaders.

No four-power participation is involved, such as in the recent trials of the 22 top Nazi leaders by the international military tribunal.

Among the indicted doctors were Karl Brandt, one of Hitler's personal physicians, and a woman, a physician in the Ravensbrueck concentration camp. The 18-page indictment alleged the doctors performed such experiments as these on their victims:

Deliberately inflicting wounds and infecting them, then forcing ground glass or wood shavings into the wounds to aggravate the infection in order to test the effectiveness of sulfa drugs.

Plunging victims into ice water or standing them naked outdoors, then experimenting on various means of reviving them.

Transplanting bones, muscles and nerves from one living victim to another to study their reproduction.
