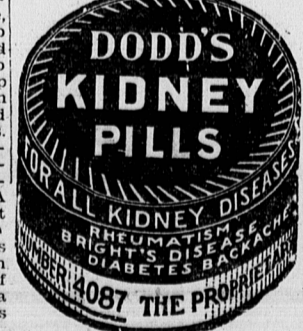

AT ROTARY

At the Rotary Luncheon yesterday the speaker was Reverend A. E. Gabriel of St. Peter's Church, who gave a most inspiring talk on Rotary, and its principles. J. A. Robertson, President of the Business Method Committee was in the chair and there was one guest, Mr. B. W. Tanton of Summerside. The musical programme included a splendid solo by Rotarian Charlie Gallagher. Mr. Gabriel first stressed the importance of Rotary Membership. Every Rotarian should realize what that membership entails, and be regular in his attendance. There should be no "knockers" in the Rotary Club. Any man who gets his living in a place should cease knocking it or else leave the place altogether. He then pointed out that if the nations would practice the principles of Rotary a better international good will would be built up. Rotary is a necessary adjunct to community life. It means putting Christianity into practice. Mr. Gabriel then referred to the starting of a Commercial Club here which he expected would develop into a Gyro Club, whose aims and principles are somewhat similar to Rotary but which stresses friendship more than the latter. He then dwelt on the virtues of sacrifice and service as exemplified in both clubs. If you want to be a live organization lose yourself in Rotary. Submerge yourself in its great principles. Think out ways of service. A store that succeeds is the store that gives the best service. Talk Rotary all the time. Express your ideas through doing things and through love, which is the embodiment of service. In conclusion he paid a high tribute to Rotary which knows no death, no defeat, and bring more
